THE VOLUNTEER FIREMEN: THEY'RE GREAT

What can we say about the performance of the Nottawa and Sherman Volunteer Firemen, except that they're the greatest? They fight fires.

They respond to emergency calls of varied descriptions.

Among the emergencies to which they responded Saturday and Saturday night were flooded basements in Weidman and the Weidman area where electrcial or gas appliances were hazards.

And among their responses--for which they are restricted from accepting any pay--was a call of desperation from Connie Skinner, whose crawl space in her erstwhile basement was flooded with 18 inches of water.

There's a brand-new gas furnace down there. There's the water pump. There's the coldwater tank.

There was also a sump pump, which, it came out in the wash (and we DO mean!) was not plugged in to electricity and therefore was ruined by the flood

Those Firemen brought their big pump-hose and gasoline engine to the old Roe house about 8.20 p.m. and proceeded to pump water out of the filled-in erstwhile basement, where water was guaranteed never to enter from Lake of the Hills again.

Don Alwood came first, in the afternoon when we discovered we had no water from the faucets, and it was then the flood was discovered.


With the Firemen, Lee Parker came, and he went barefoot down there after the Firemen's big hose got some of the water pumped out.

Lee found the electric pump ruined; the sump pump ruined; the low-voltage connections to the gas furnace knocked out; and he and the Firemen found that water rose up as fast as it was pumped out.

In other words, either the Firemen were to stay all night with their pump-hose crew, or a new sump pump had to be secured and installed so the Firemen could go home.

Fox Hardware said they sold their last sump pump Saturday afternoon. We got Howard Til-

mann out of bed around 11 p.m. (Continued on Next Page)

FLOODED BASEMENTS

WERE GENERAL IN WEIDMAN Flooded basements were common in Weidman town over the weekend, for the first time in recent history. Gray's pond was a worry to

county officials, and Saturday night County Sheriff Donald Gillis and Deputy Wayne Sisco were up there watching the water level rise. Chuck Zalad, County Road Engineer, also was at the Gray pond that night.

The officials stayed, watching the water rise, and as it started going over the top, they got Miles Miller with his bulldozer to push dirt against the dam to hold it, plugging a hole in the dam, according to Deputy Sisco. The county officials sat with Gray's pond all night, Sisco said, and reported the water there had dropped six to eight inches from crest by Monday morning.

The dam has a bypass of sod waterway which had grown up to cattails, Sisco said, and Duane Gray, owner of the pond, promised to remove the cattails.

Gray's pond menaces the Ojibwa lakes, Windoga and Minne-tonka, when high water shows as it did last week.

On Lake of the Hills, all boards stayed in the dam as usual throughout the flood rains the past weeks. Water levels in all areas around the lake were correspondingly high, and the town of Weidman had flooded (Continued on Back Page)

Once more Connie Skinner is faced with a crisis covered by no insurance and no sympathy from Lake of the Hills bigwigs.

We may have to discard a new furnace and buy a new one; we must discard the water pump and buy a new one; we must buy a new cold-water tank, and have all these installed somewhere on the first floor of the house.

We've got a good-sized finan-cial headache on our hands; but we do thank the Firemen, Lee Parker, Howard Tilmann, Don Alwood, Ray Smith, and also Frances Tranbarger, who gave us help and comfort during the nerve-wracking weekend. -0-




