Editor's Column

HIGH SCHOOL VOCATIONAL ED MISSES THE MARK

During the past two weeks we have been through experiences that opened our eyes to the cost of plumbers and heating-devices men, and it set us to thinking about the growing demand for more courses "relating" to today's labor-market demands.

Our house was without water for 10 days; and without heat for about 13 days (the time span ran smack into the Labor Day weekend).

When we did manage to get help for our flooded furnace and water pump and well, we found that these men make more per hour than school teachers--and the teachers are in the gravy.

Last Thursday evening we paid Dick Green of Superior Torber-son's Plumbing and Heating Com-pany in Mt. Pleasant \$350.00 for a small shallow-well jet pump, its connections and a plumber's labor.

Dick Green said the plumber's wages were figured at \$12 per hour, and that constituted the main part of the bill.

Even, as we were later told by another plumber, if the com-pany took half the plumber's per-hour wages, the plumber gets \$48.00 for an eight-hour day. He gets \$240.00 per week for a 40-hour week. He gets \$12,400 per year.

He is not a master plumber.

So the high schools are trying to institute courses "relevant" to today's labor-market needs.

Most of the high school's voca-tional courses are obsolete now or will be within 20 years.

The Mt. Pleasant High School offers courses in electricity (an electrician is very highly paid, too), heating and air condition-ing (ditto on the pay), but also machine shop (obsolete now), welding (doubtful and scheduled for obsolescence), and that old gag, "woodworking".

Did you ever hear of a high school offering courses in plumb-ing? Neither did we. Yet the shortage of plumbers is acute, and growing more so.

The Weidman area has two working plumbers, both holding steady jobs in Mt. Pleasant, one refusing local jobs because of union regulations, the other tak-ing on what he can after he gets

home from his high-paying job in Mt. Pleasant.

We deserve better than that.

This area is growing, and rapidly. If kids graduating from high school are not college-bound, then what's the future for them?

The Mt. Pleasant High School offers carpentry, but that too will be obsolete in 20 years. Mobile homes and modular homes are going up all over the place, and while carpenters and builders at this moment are so busy they can't keep up, they'll find themselves wondering what happened, and within a relatively short time.

Electricity, plumbing, heating and air conditioning are the crucially-short vocations at this time, and they will continue to be so because of the rising influx of new families in this area.

But of course the schools could not hire a mere plumber to teach classes, even if the plumber is pulling down as much money or more than the school principal. The teachers' unions and the State Board of Education have made it impossible to hire a mere skilled laborer who knows his trade to teach that trade in public schools.

Qualified teachers, with college degrees, naturally have not soiled their hands with the labors of plumbing and heating work. There are many other skilled fields not being touched in the schools' "vocational education" programs.

Any young man who really wants work can get it, if he will apply himself, and right here at home.

Our trouble is, we've raised at least two generations on the lovely theory that school must be fun and games, and high school graduates often simply don't know how to work.

The fortunate ones are those whose old-fashioned parents (those over 40) have taught their children the most valuable element of life--how to work.

We do have some kids who do know how to work--and they're in demand full time as available at good pay for kids.

When will the schools get down to reality in their "vocational education" programs?

the Forest Hill Cemetery at Horr.

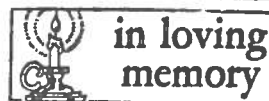
She was born May 5, 1919, in

the circuit, in order to inform voters of the importance of this election, and to acquaint voters with Mr. O'Connell's qualifications, especially his many years of actual legal experience.

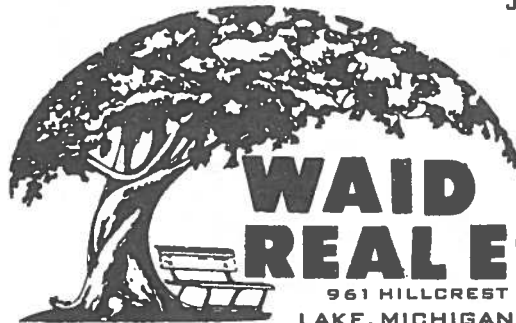
Mrs. Gray said this week: "It is imperative that the voters become aware of who is running for this important position.

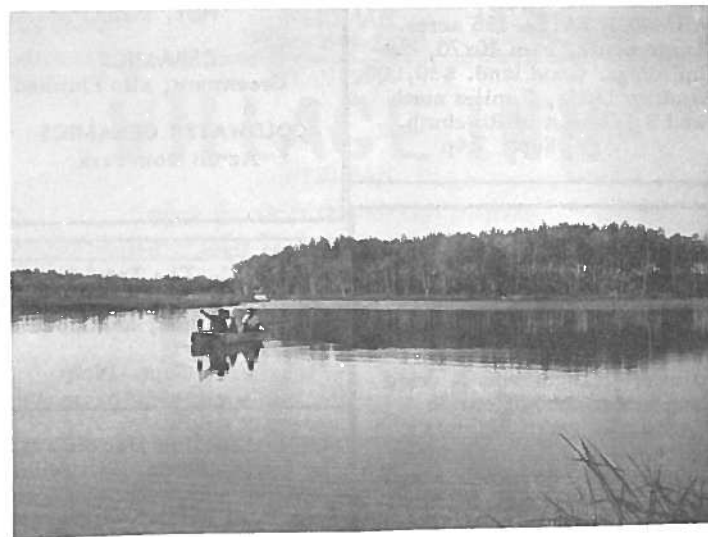

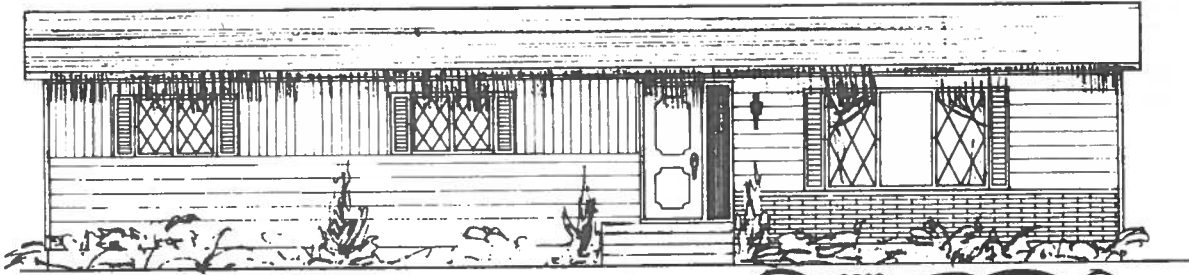
