built for hauling horse-powered sleighs high-loaded with logs out of the woods.

These specially-built roads were "iced" in winter by pouring or sprinkling water on them in deep-freezing weather, so the horse teams could pull huge loads of logs.

In summer they were used for hauling logs out on speciallybuilt wagons, some with extrabig wheels.

There are many old "logging road" beds in the Weidman area. They still stand firm and rugged, running through wilderness and stopping abruptly as modern development has cut across them or obliterated them at intervals

John S. Weidman shipped logs and lumber out of Weidman after the town was established and the Pere Marquette Railroad put in a spur line up from Remus.

The logs shipped out of Weidman town were hardwood, we're told, probably sent to furniture factories in Grand Rapids.

Hardwood was not in style at that time for house-building or finishing.

Prime white pine was the thing, and there are some houses and barns in this area with outside finish of prime white pine; and they stand unblemished today, and we're told they take paint better than any modern wood or finish that can be bought on today's market.

Sand and stones hauled in were subsequently washed out, except the stones, in a following downpour.




