SENIOR CITIZENS CAN GET TAX EXEMPTIONS THIS YEAR

If we understand the situation correctly, Senior Citizens can get tax exemptions on their homes to the full extent offered by the State of Michigan (up to \$500) even though they were registered with their Township Supervisors for the 1973 \$85 limit on tax cuts heretofore in effect.

The \$85 exemption was based on assessed valuation of \$2,500 on homes. Now Senior Citizens can get up to \$500 exemption if their homes are assessed at more than \$2,500 valuation. Those whose homes are \$2,500 or less in assessment need not file for the added state benefit.

Those with homes assessed over \$2,500 may file for the added benefits if their incomes do not exceed \$3,000 per year from all sources.

You must pick up the application forms yourself, at banks or post offices, or write the Michigan Department of the Treasury requesting the forms. The forms will not be sent out as previously announced.

Those home owners who know what their annual income will be for this year may file with the state for the upped exemptions Dec. 1. It is now expected that refunds may be received as early as four to six weeks after receipts of exemption applications.

To get up to the \$500 exemption, your income must not exceed \$3,000 annually from all sources. If your home is valued so that taxes will be more than \$500, the state will pay the first \$500 and you pay anything over that.

The Sherman Township Zoning Board met Wednesday, September 19, 1973. In the course of that meeting it was decided to recommend the following:

1. Article VIII, Administration, paragraph 3, which now reads "...shall not exceed five dollars (\$5.00), regardless of cost of..." should be changed to read "... shall not exceed ten dollars (\$10.00), regardless of cost of..."

2. Article II, Section A, paragraph 3, should be changed as follows:

b. The remainder of the paragraph shall be deleted.

c. The following three sentences shall be added:

It is also prohibited to park or store more than two unlicensed vehicles within 200' of any roadway or property line in the township. Furthermore, if exception be made to the above restrictions, it shall be required that such exceptions be surrounded by a 6' high solid fence. Any exceptions to these restrictions must have the approval of the Township Zoning Board of Appeals.

3. After having a lengthy discus sion on the subject of mobile homes and travel trailers, we were unable to agree on any changes to be made in our ordinance.





A History of Weidman

(In the interim between John S. Weidman's building of his sawmills in 1893 and about 1910.)

There was the big hotel, located where Marshall Sales & Service and the Weidman Rexall Pharmacy now are housed. Robert and Peter Aylsworth built a big building there, including a saloon and livery stable. The livery barn was located between the hotel and Max Girards or George Drallette's meat market. The saloon was located back of the livery barn, about where Palmer's Bar now operates.

Where the Nottawa and Sherman Volunteer Firemen's barn now stands, there was built a two-story building to house the town's first furniture and undertaking business, owned by Lawrence Shephard, father

of Allie Shephard.

Most business places, on first establishment, had second-story living quarters for the owners' families. These were mainly destroyed in the town's first fire, in 1897. Everyone rebuilt, although as we understand it, there was no such thing as fire insurance at that time.

Houses for families became a necessity soon in the town's beginning growth. John Rufner, father of Oscar Rufner, built the first residence after the Weidman home. The house is located

where the Dan Wernette family now live; and although the Wernettes have completely remodeled the house, they kept the basic building and "built around it", thus preserving an historic landmark. The house was built in May, 1894. John Rufner worked in Weidman's sawmill. The sawmill and planing mill were John S. Weidman's first establishment here. Mr. Rufner was assisted in the building of the town's first residence by Mr. Meeker. Later Mr. Meeker put up a home back of Leon McArthur's garage as it stands today.

Royal Gibbs built a huge hotel and livery barn where an abandoned gas station now staned, on the corner of Main and Third Streets. The hotel prospered for many years, well into the Twentieth Century, or about 1908 or 1909.

Every family--and presently there were many families living in the town of Weidman--kept a cow, for milk, cream and butter, the businessman going home at night to milk the cow, and doing the same chore before opening his store in the morning.

Cows roamed the streets of Weidman, and every house had to have a fence, with a gate, to keep neighbors' cows off the premises. (Nobody had lawns,

in those days.)

Brinton, Sherman City, Drew and Beal City all were established villages when John S. Weidman came to the wilderness which was the Weidman area at that time.

We have some notes written by Vina (Flower) Bailey in 1972, "The First I Remember of Weid-

man":

The David Flower family came in January of 1895. He was the first section foreman. The mills were running at that time, a sawmill and planing mill, but I don't think the shingle mill was running yet.

But there were two hotels, one the Gibbs and the other Aylsworth's, and Scott's store and Damon's. The meat market at that time was owned by Max Girard.

The postoffice was located across the alley from the old Messenger printshop on Main Street. The first postmaster was Mr. Parsons, and he lived in the house now owned by Al Woodbury.

Furniture and undertaking was where the Fire Hall is now or closer to the corner. It was a large two-story building, the owner Lawrence Shephard and

son, Allie.

The first big fire occurred in the block where Abbott's Furniture is now, then it was Scott's. Everything burned from that building south (but the Scott store building did not burn).
