With a Republican House and Congress you need not be scared about business futures. It will take a lot of lumber to fix up things in France.

Keep the business nerved up. Fear not.

ADVICE TO DEER HUNTERS

By Richard F. Nowak, D.O. Medical Director, Central Michigan Health Departments.

Attention, deer hunters! It is that time of the year to get your rifles out and ready for another deer hunting season. This year your rifle may by 100 percent ready, but are you? Have you considered the safety rules that go with owning a rifle, or will you be another careless, ignor-ant, selfish hunter with a spanking clean rifle? No hunting accident except a very rare one could be called unavoidable.

Most of the accidents that occur during deer hunting season are caused by persons who are not familiar with firearms or safety rules. The Central Michigan District Health Department urges all hunters to remember general safety rules which should be learned by the hunter for his own safety and the safety of others.

Know your gun. Make sure that it is in good operating condition. Check the ammunition before using. Sight in your rifle before hunting season so that you will know your point of aim and your proper range. Learn to be a good shot.

Handle your own property. Treat every rifle as if it were loaded. Always point your muzzle in a safe direction. Be sure of your target. Keep your fingers OFF the trigger until ready to fire. Don't release the safety until you have the rifle lined up with the target. Practice self-control when not using the rifle; have the chamber empty and the action open. Make sure the barrel is free from obstruction.

Fulfill your responsibilities as a safe hunter. Follow the rules of safe hunting. Learn to identify game. Know and observe state game laws. Be courteous to farmers and other hunt-

when hunting with others and walking in a file or abreast, be sure to carry your rifle in such a way that it will not endanger your fellow hunters. Grip the small of the stock in the trigger hand and cradle the barrel in the crock of the other arm, or hold the small of the stock with the trigger hand and the fore end with the other hand. This may be the best way, as it gives better control of the muzzle at all times.

If careful consideration is given to the rules of hunting safety, it will be a much more enjoyable hunting season for all.


