



In a news release from Dr. Richard F. Nowak, D.O., Medical Director of the Central Michigan Health Departments, it was pointed out that hot weather poses problems in keeping and serving some foods.

Dr. Nowak advises that all food preparations consisting of mayonnaise or salad dressing blends must be kept at a temperature of 45 degrees or below until served, to be safe for human consumption. This includes those potentially hazardous picnic foods which consist in whole or in part of milk or milk products, eggs, fish, poultry, meat, and such items as cream-filled

pies and cakes, custards, and potato salads.

All food that is to be eaten without cooking should be kept from contact with uncooked poultry or eggs.

Keep hot foods hot (140 degrees) and cold foods cold (45 degrees or below).

degrees or below).

If there is any doubt or suspicion that a canned food is undercooked, poorly sealed or leaking, throw it out.

Dr. Nowak points out that food poisoning is a completely preventable disease. Summer is a hazardous time for unrefrigerated foods, such as those carried to picnics.
