SMALL ENGINES COURSE OFFERED AT MID MICHIGAN Mid Michigan Community College at Harrison has received approval from the State Board of Education to offer a new career education program in recreational vehicle maintenance and service, beginning this fall.

The program is designed to provide over 900 hours of instruction, both in classroom and laboratory, on the repair and maintenance of all types of recreational and garden equipment, including snowmobiles, motorcycles, lawn trac-tors, outboard and inboard marine engines, chain saws, lawnmowers, etc.

The program is planned for two semesters of study, requir-ing approximately 30 hours per week of laboratory and classroom work.

The program will be conducted in the recently completed new Small Engine Laboratory Building on Mid Michigan Community College's main campus. The program is divided into seven main classes:

Small engine fundamentals, lawnmower and garden equipment, electrical fundamentals, business math or other math courses, fundamentals of business operation, outboard-inboard marine engines, and recreational vehicle maintenance and service.

Classes in the new program will begin Sept. 4. Persons interested in enrolling either fulltime or part time in this program are urged to contact Mid Michigan Community College as soon as possible, as enroll-ment will be limited. ---0----





HEALTH DEPARTMENT WARNS AGAINST ANIMAL BITES

Certain health hazards go along with the summer fun which the warm weather brings. One of these hazards, according to Dr. Richard F. Nowak, director of the Central Michigan District Health Department, is the increased exposure to animal bites during the months of June, July and August.

Dr. Nowak says this summer can be a safe one if certain precautions are taken. Make sure your own pets and the others in your neighborhood have had their rabies shots. Avoid handling stray animals and those which appear sick. Avoid excessive handling of your own pet. Just like humans, animals become irritable in hot and humid weather, Dr. Nowak says.

If a member of your family should be bitten by an animal, remember these important "rabies rules":

1. Identify the animal that did the biting so it can be watched and examined if necessary.

2. Confine the animal if possible. Killing the animal may make it impossible to tell whether or not it has rabies. If the animal does have rabies, it will appear within 10 days and the person having been bitten will then receive the proper treatment. If the animal must be killed, do not damage the head or freeze it. The brain can then be examined for evidence of rabies.

3. Apply first aid by washing the wound with soap and water for 15 minutes.

4. See a doctor if there is some doubt about the health of the biting animal.

5. Report the incident to your local health department, dog warden or the police.

Dr. Nowak explained that dogs are the major source of rabies, but any warm-blooded animals, including man, may have or catch rabies. The disease is caused by a virus that attacks the spinal cord and brain of the infected person or animal.

The virus is contained in the saliva of the infected animal and is spread by the saliva getting into a break in the skin. Rabies usually is spread by the bite of an infected animal, but you need only handle an infected animal while having an open cut or scratch to become infected.

(Editor's note: Owners applying for licenses to own dogs must show a veterinarian's certificate of rabies inoculation during the past three years, which is a good argument both for rabies inoculation and dog licensing.) --0---






