Editor's Column

THE SCHOOL MILLAGE ELECTION IS AUGUST 27

A special election on a request for two additional mills taxation for three years is scheduled for next Monday, Aug. 27. The two mills additional taxation is being asked for "operational expenses". The Board says it will be used to repair the elementary buildings of the district.

The proposition of a four-million-dollar bond issue, which included the repairs and the oft-rejected swimming pool, was snowed under in an earlier vote this summer.

Voters in Isabella County may cast their votes at the Weidman school. Polls will be open from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m.

The Mt. Pleasant school district asked for and got an additional one-mill additional tax for three years, to renovate five elementary schools and repair the high school building.

Mt. Pleasant apparently can do more for half the amount the Chippewa Hills board is asking.

Voters are asking, "Howcum"?

Monday we got a flyer through the mail, addressed to Boxholder, advising us that, if the two mills for three years request is turned down, "it will result in serious curtailment of programs and services being offered."

That's the perennial threat of all school boards demanding more money from real estate taxes.

Why not pare off a little fat in the administrative section? We believe the elementary schools could be maintained on regular schedules annually if the school budget weren't dripping with fat for "administrative expenses".

Incidentally, the wording of the ballot is such that we will be voting to pay two mills for three years for "operational expenses". The flyer says the money will be used to repair elementary buildings, but the ballot says no such thing.

BURTON WARD ON TV

Television station WWTV at Cadillac sent a camera and reporting crew to the Ward farm Monday afternoon, and gave a good presentation of the situation on its 6 o'clock news.

Included in the television presentation was the ewe that had a leg chewed off by one of the marauding dogs. Burton stated the case very well on television.

THE BURTON WARD SHEEP FLOCK DECIMATED BY DOGS

Pairs or packs of killer dogs struck the Burton Ward sheep pasture again Sunday night and Monday morning, with 20 sheep killed or maimed so they will die as the result. One of the 20 was a registered Hampshire ram for which the Wards paid \$70 a year ago. The rest were ewes, many with suckling lambs which were injured or will die from starvation.

The Wards killed one yellow collie-type dog and hit another without killing it, just across the road from their home, in the front of the sheep pasture, after 7 o'clock Monday morning.

Not all the dead and injured sheep and lambs had been gathered up by afternoon Monday, though Burton took two trailerloads of injured sheep to the barn earlier.

One sheep was found with one leg chewed off. It was still alive.

It had been over a month since the initial killings in the Ward flock, and they thought the slaughter was over. Originally, they had 52 ewes, all of which had lambed this spring, many with twins. To date they have lost 40 ewes and one registered ram to killer dogs. Their other ram, a registered Columbian ram, for which they paid \$70, was injured so that it was believed it will die. The Wards paid \$90 a year ago for their registered Hampshire ram which was killed in the first raid over a month ago.

To date the Wards have lost 41 sheep out of a flock of 54 before the dogs began their night killings. Lambs are not counted.

Two Rivers neighbors have assisted the Wards, one neighbor shooting three dogs and another sending two to the animal shelter to be killed.

Burton turned in a claim for 16 of the original 21 that were killed by dogs, and received \$20 a head from the county.

The Wards are naturally discouraged on the dog situation. No solution had yet been offered as we went to press, on the situation of a man being unable to run sheep on his own 80-acre tract of land.

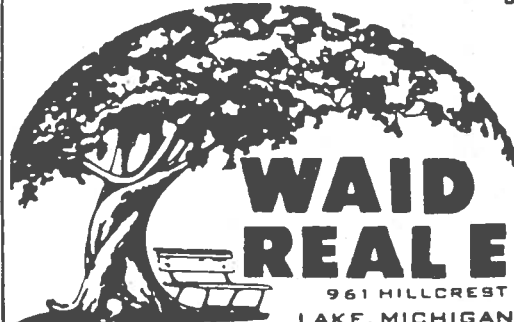

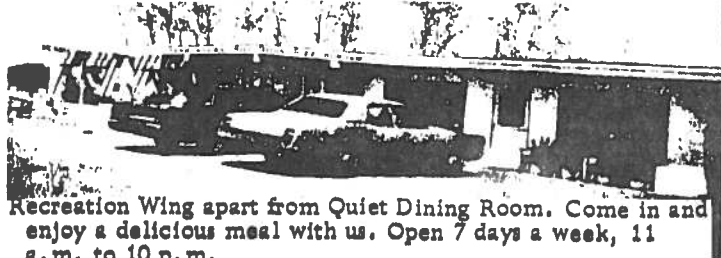

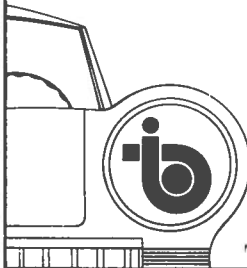
