
They can't handle it.

SCHOOL MILLAGE PROPOSAL TURNED DOWN, 719-506


In Monday's school millage election voters turned down the proposal of an extra two mills taxation for three years by a vote of 719 No to 506 Yes.

Radio Station WCEN said on Tuesday morning's news broadcast that taxpayers in the district will be spared further election taxation proposals until next year.

The Fox family heard their dog outside the house "talking," but not sounding a "strangers around" alarm. Inasmuch as Weidman's main street (Woodruff Road) is a roaring freeway for cars as the bars close here, the Fox family paid no attention.

"We have noise and speeding cars around here every night," they said.

Stolen was a prized small statue of a black boy holding out his hand, made to receive a house number or yard light, Wayne told the Messenger reporter.

The statue was bolted into wood on the front porch, and "it took some strength to wrench it loose from there," Wayne Fox said.

Mr. and Mrs. Fox bought the statue in Alabama about five years ago, and it was a prized family possession.

A charge of malicious destruction and theft was lodged by State Police, but there were no further developments as we went to press. HARD DRUGS STOLEN FROM WEIDMAN PHARMACY

The theft of some money and drugs, including "hard" narcotics, has been under investigation the past week by Detective Bert Palmer of the Isabella County Sheriff's Department.

Lou Fiorillo, owner of the Weidman Rexall Pharmacy, said 1,000 Dilantin pills, used in treatment of epileptic seizures, were stolen along with the other drugs.

Entry was gained by cutting a hole in the roof of the pharmacy building.

This is the first overt indication of drug-users in the Weidman area.

STATE POLICE PATROLLING WARD SHEEP PASTURE FOR MARAUDING KILLER DOGS

State police have been doing night patrol in the Burton Ward sheep pasture the past week in efforts to kill marauding dogs that have decimated the Wards' flock.

As of Monday evening, the Wards reported 19 sheep dead and the purebred ram in serious condition.

Mrs. Ward said Monday night that she goes to the barn often to clean wounds on the ram and disinfect them, clean up maggots in the torn flesh, and otherwise make the ram as comfortable as possible under the circumstances. "We don't know if he'll pull

through or not," Mrs. Ward said.
Some ewes are still missing,
she told the Messenger, four of
them with broken legs. They
had been with the flock until
Monday, when they failed to
show up with the other sheep.
Mrs. Ward said that someone

Mrs. Ward said that someone had called the State Police, giving the Wards' telephone number and saying he was calling from the Wards' home, and that he knew who owned the killer dogs.

The Wards have had calls from people asking if meat from the carcasses would be fit for eating. Another called and said he was a professional hunter and he would guarantee to get the dogs. On showing up at the Ward farm, he turned out to be a student from the Mt. Pleasant university.

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

Eight ballots were spoiled in the overall district.

A school official said Tuesday that apparently "the buildings will just fall apart."

Taxpayers appear to be of the opinion that maintenance of buildings should be part of the operating budget for the district.
