

LEON G. MCARTHUR Leon G. McArthur died Monday afternoon, Sept. 3, at CMC Hospital after a long illness. He was 77 years old.

He was born March 13, 1896, in Woodbury, Ionia County, and came to Weidman in the early part of this century.

In 1915 he was working as a bookkeeper for the Holmes Milling Company and later as bookkeeper for the mill and also the Weidman Banking Company, then unincorporated.

He was promoted to cashier of the bank, and became the bank's president, retiring in 1970 as president of the bank, after 50 years of service there.

He was a life member of the James A. Cliff Lodge, F&AM, and also a life member of the Waubenoo Chapter of the Eastern Stars here. His late wife, Gladys was also a life member of the Stars.

He was an active and devoted member of the Weidman United Church. He established and operated the McArthur Insurance Agency here, now owned by his son-in-law and daughter, Bernard and Yvonne Pitts.





HOME PAPER FOR THE WEST HALF OF ISABELLA COUNTY

JOHN S. WEIDMAN INDUCED THE PERE MARQUETTE RAILROAD TO EXTEND ITS LINE-From the Bundy Hills sawmills on up to Weidman, a "spur" line. There was no possible turn-around for the engine after it discharged its duties at Weidman, so that if the train came here with the engine head-first, it had to back all the way to Remus (or possibly Big Rapids, for it would take a turn-table to turn the engine around). During the first 10 or 12 years, Weidman had a daily train arrival; one engine in several freight cars, and one passenger coach. "Drummers", or salesmen, came in numbers on the train, to sell their wares to Weidman stores. At one time (about 1912) there were three restaurants in Weidman to arrive mainly the document of the ball the ball the ball. Weidman to serve mainly the drummers arriving with the daily train. After World War I the truck began to appear, and immediately began to cut into the railways' volume of business. During the 1930s the railroad was torn up, and later the depot building was dismantled. In the old photo above, taken probably before 1914, the Grit boy got his papers at the railway station. "Lant" Boyer did a good business with his two-horse dray, hauling freight daily to stores and homes where designated. In the photo above, the train must have backed all the way here from Remus at least, as the engine is headed out, or south. Behind the depot a freight car has been shunted for unloading and pickup as an empty car the next trip up for the train.




