DON'T FORGET THE SCHOOL ELECTION, SET FOR MARCH 12

Don't forget the special school election, which has not been overly publicized around here (the Messenger has received no official word of it), and which is set for Tuesday, March 12.

The Board of Education of the Chippewa Hills School District will be asking us for an additional three mills taxation besides a renewal of the 12 additional mills we're now paying.

In the school's quasi-official

In the school's quasi-official organ, the Chippewa Hills Courier of Big Rapids, it is stated that there will be a request for renewal of the 12-mill tax for the next three years; an additional two-mill tax for operating expenses; and an additional one-mill tax for "maintenance and renovation of elementary and secondary buildings" in Barryton, Remus, Weidman and Mecosta. Seems like we remember when

Seems like we remember when the heat was on for us to vote for consolidation into the big-big district, there were fervid promises that all existing school buildings in the small towns would be maintained adequately indefinite

ly.

"Maintenance," as we've always understood the word, means
repairing leaky roofs or putting
on new roofs; repairing falling
plaster or replastering where
necessary; repairing heating and
plumbing plants or replacing
them where necessary.


To the Board of Education, apparently "maintenance" means none of these things. According to publicity last year when the Board asked for additional taxes for fixing up the school buildings all four small-town schools were practically falling down from want of repair (maintenance, as we used to call it).

Now we're asked to fork over

Now we're asked to fork over three more mills in taxes for three years, two mills for "operational expenses" and one for upkeep of the buildings we were promised would be maintained.

On my own homestead taxation the sum total of the bill was broken down thus:

County tax, \$38.50. Township (Continued on Back Page)

Notice

The Sherman Township Zoning Board met Wednesday, September 19, 1973. In the course of that meeting it was decided to recommend the following:

1. Article VIII, Administration, paragraph 3, which now reads "...shall not exceed five dollars (\$5.00), regardless of cost of..." should be changed to read "... shall not exceed ten dollars (\$10.00), regardless of cost of.."

2. Article II, Section A, paragraph 3, should be changed as follows:

a. The first sentence shall remain as is.

b. The remainder of the paragraph shall be deleted.

c. The following three sentences shall be added:

It is also prohibited to park or store more than two unlicensed vehicles within 200' of any roadway or property line in the township. Furthermore, if exception be made to the above restrictions, it shall be required that such exceptions be surrounded by a 6' high solid fence. Any exceptions to these restrictions must have the approval of the Township Zoning Board of Appeals.

Essential Services The erection, construction, alteration or maintenance by public utilities or municipal departments or commissions, of overhead, surface or underground gas, electrical, steam, or water, distribution or transmission systems, collection, communication, supply or disposal systems, including mains, drains, sewers, pipes, conduits, tunnels, wires, cables, fire alarm boxes, police call boxes, traffic signals, hydrants, towers, poles, electrical substations, gas regulator stations and other similar equipment and accessories in connection therewith, reasonably necessary for the furnishing of adequate service by such public utility or municipal department or commission or for the public health or safety or general welfare, shall be permitted as authorized or regulated by law and other ordinances of the township of Sherman in any use district, it being the intention hereof to except such erection, construction, alteration, and maintenance from the application of this Ordinance.

3. After having a lengthy discussion on the subject of mobile homes and travel trailers, we were unable to agree on any changes to be made in our ordinance.


Michelle's parents live at 245 East Weidman Road, and many in the Weidman area know Mike who played softball on a Weidman team.

Michelle is four years old. She


was burned over 35 percent of her body with first and seconddegree burns.




