ALTON ALLEN

Alton Allen passed away Sunday morning, Feb. 3, at CMC Hospital in Mt. Pleasant, after a long illness. He was 71.

He was a retired partner in the large Allen Lumber Company enterprises, which included the development of Lake of the Hills, and other land and building projects.

He and his wife, Beatrice, came to Weidman in the spring of 1960 from Alma, where both Alton and his son, Ivan, worked for a lumber company.

In 1961 they purchased the Weidman Lumber Company, owned by Bernard Woodruff, and since then the Allen company has greatly enlarged the business, built two new buildings (their first one the modest offices on the corner of Bridge Street and Woodruff Road), and recently the company moved into its very large new building at the site of the lumber yard, on the west side of Woodruff Road.

Alton Allen was born July 24, 1902, in Wheeler, Mich.

In 1925 he was united in marriage to Beatrice Green of Wheeler, and to this union were born three sons, Alton, Junior, Rev. Carl R. Allen, and Ivan D. Allen. Also surviving are 10 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren; a brother, Orla, of Saginaw; a sister, Mrs. Fred (Roselee) Bioginia, of California.

Arlo A. Allem, a resident of Coldwater Lake, drowned Saturday night in Lake Isabella when his snowmobile broke through ice estiamted at one to two inches thick.

EARL BLODGETT RECALLS OLD SHERMAN CITY DAYS

Earl Blodgett came in to the Messenger office one day last week and bought some of the 1899 land-ownership plats, including the plat of Sherman City. He reminisced about the old days in that once-thriving village.

His parents moved on their home place in 1902, south and southwest of Sherman City, when Earl was nine months old. They first bought 40 acres from a railroad company in Sheridan Township, Mecosta County, then took on 80 acres in Sec. 6 in Sherman Township, Isabella. Earl's father was Francis Lafayette Blodgett, and the family grew up in the Sherman City area.

Earl says that Gil Johnson owned most of the land thereabouts. Mack MacKersie was Justice of the Peace, Ed Estes ran the flour mill, one of the best in the state, Earl says.

There was the McDowell Cheese Factory, a non-denominational church, the Sherman City post office, a school, two grocery stores, six hotels, one blacksmith shop, Dr. Soper's office, the Maccabee Hall, a hardware store, and John Cameron's Drug Store.

When timber in that area was cut and sawed and shipped, however, Sherman City rapidly went down.

Once it was a bustling town.

NEW HELP AGENCY IN ISABELLA COUNTY

A new agency devoted to volunteer help for problem pregnancies has been established in Isabella County. It is called "Lifeline--Pregnancy Aid of Central Michigan, Inc."

Its sole purpose is to help girls with problem pregnancies, according to a spokesman for the group. The agency has professional counsellors, and access to various government agencies for financial aid for such girls.

It is a separate organization from the Right to Life group, which is active against abortion on demand. This group has a positive approach in trying to help girls and women, single or married, who contact them. They can give assistance in the line of medical help, expert counselling, and also each member is pledged to act in the capacity of friend to any girl or woman who needs friendship and help.

They have no funds as such. All work and all supplies, such as clothing for expectant mothers and babies, are donated. At present the group needs maternity clothing, all sizes; and layettes, new or nearly news.

The group has a charter as a charitable institution, and any money donations to it are tax deductable.

It will be affiliated with the national group of Abortion Alternatives, Inc. This is a worldwide federation of pro-life

emergency pregnancy services. The Isabella County group has regular office hours in the Commercial Building in Mt. Pleasant. Its hours are 4 to 6 p.m. Mondays, 2 to 4 Wednesdays, and 6 to 8 p.m. Friday. Its telephone number is 772-3432.

At present the group is seeking people who might license their homes to help girls who need homes during pregnancy and afterward. Licensing of homes can be made through the Bureau of Social Serivces in the County Building at Mt. Pleasant.

The Lifeline--Pregnancy Aid of Central Michigan held a formal opening of its offices in Room 6 in the Commercial Building in Mt. Pleasant Monday, Feb. 4, from 4 to 6 p.m.
