Lieut. Thomas Straus, a navigator in the United States Air Force, is doing some traveling around at present, from Washington to Florida and California


He is expected home on leave around the end of May, after which he will be sent to Thailand.

FARMERS FEEL PINCH IN OBTAINING FERTILIZERS

The Weidman area is no exception to the world-wide situation of shortage of farm fertilizers this spring, according to the Michigan Farmer—and Bader Milling Company, which also is no exception to the rule of difficulty in dealers' getting fertilizer supplies for their customers:

The shortage apparently is caused mainly by the oil shortage or threatened shortage, also world-wide.

Nitrogen, for instance, a crucial ingredient in farm fertilizers is produced in plants run by natural gas to produce ammonia.

There are only two plants being built in the United States for ammonia production, one of which will have only local (Oklahoma) influence, according to the Michigan Farmer. The other plant is being built by Agrico, expected to begin operations in late 1975. And that, says the Farmer, is the end of additional ammonia construction in this country.

Many old ammonia plants are not effective. Phillips Petroleum shut down an ammonia plant during one of the most critical times of ammonia need. Total U.S. production of ammonia is expected to be about the same as last year. Thirty-seven million acres of wheat are expected to come into production within 18 months, according to the Farmer. Estimates of the shortfall on fertilizer are impossible, the Farmer says, until it's known how much farmers are going to plant--and with wheat and corn prices hitting the sky, it is expected the planting will be very heavy; that is, a heavy increase

over last year.

Canada, a major exporter to
us of fertilizer components, has
a tremendous new demand for
fertilizers, especially in the

wheat-growing provinces. It is estimated that 37,000,000 new acres of farm land will be put into wheat production this year in this country. Wheat growers need nitrogen fertilizers.

Ammonium nitrate, another fertilizer ingredient, is also in heavy use in mining. As the Michigan Farmer said, "All you have to do is take a ton of farmer's fertilizer, put in a little oil, stick a blasting cap in it, and blow up half the state of Michigan." The government is pressuring the mining industry to step up production, and the mines can't operate without ammonium nitrate. Farmers, apparently, come second after the coal mines.

The Michigan Farmer says,

"This ammonium nitrate has to go to coal mining or the lights go out. It's that simple."

No new ammonium nitrate plants are being planned in this country.

Phosphate is also made with ammonia. All phosphate products are expected to be very tight during the rest of this year. All fertilizer components are, needless to say, sky-high in price.

Rock phosphates are exported from this country to Canada; and if we didn't export rock phosphates to Canada, they could get mad and and stop the flow of potash to the United States.

We produce two million tons of potash in this country, but we import another five million tons of it from Canada.

"If we slap on embargos (on exports), Canada will cut off the potash. Mexico will cut off phosphates. Holland will cut off the urea that comes into Michigan through the Great Lakes. It could go on and on."

As the Farmer points out, the world market sets the price of such things as farm fertilizers, and the world market is out of sight.

However, the Farmer says, in its article by Dayton Matlick quoting Ed Wheeler, president of the Fertilizer Institute, "There is no doubt in my mind that we have arrived at a golden age of agriculture."

We do hope.
