18-YEAR-OLDS STILL POTENTIAL SOLDIERS

Word from state headquarters of the Selective Service System says that young men born in 1955 will have their Selective Service (draft) numbers drawn March 20 during the sixth annual draft lottery in Washington.

Michigan has approximately 75,000 19-year-olds who will have their lottery numbers established by the drawing. The present standby Selective Service system is required, the news release says, to continue to register and classify young men as part of the defense preparedness program.

All young men are required to register at the time of their 18th birthday, under the draft law. They are assigned random sequence numbers through the lottery in the year in which they become 19, at which time they are potentially vulnerable to induction into military duty during the calendar year of their 20th birthday.

In this area 18-year-olds can register in Mt. Pleasant. ---0----



"Ballots may be returned by mail, in person, or by a person other than the voter. If returned by mail place necessary postage on the envelope. Deposit it in a mail receptacle so that it will reach the clerk in time to be delivered to the polling place or counting center by 8 p.m. on election day. If returned in person, the ballots must be in the hands of the clerk before the polls open. If returned by a person other than the voter, they must be delivered to the clerk in time to be delivered by him to the polls or counting place before 8 p.m. on election day." ---0---

Letter to the Editor:

Regarding the upcoming millage election.

Many of us are not totally con-vinced that the consolidation of school districts to form the large Chippewa Hills School District was in the best interest of our children and their education. However, the consolidation did pass on a vote by the residents of the district. There is no way we can undo that vote. As long as we cannot change it, we might as well make the most of it. This is only common sense. Although it does have its drawbacks, there are also advantages and virtues worth mentioning.

For example, in the small school district of Beal City, tax-payers are paying \$30.20 on school taxes for every \$1,000.00 of assessed valuation. Compare this with the larger Chippewa Hills School District which only has \$24.00 on school taxes for every \$1,000.00 of assessed val-uation. So actually we are giving our children an education at less cost than we could if we were a small school district. Also the students of any school district no longer have to pay for their school books and supplies. This is also a savings to parents, but at the same time puts an extra financial squeeze on the school districts.

Another example, the Chippewa Hills school district has an excellent hot lunch program, which costs the biggest eater no more than 30¢ per day. This often includes seconds. My children rave about the delicious lunches prepared, and any shopper knows she could not satisfy her children at home for 30¢. In comparison to this, the Farwell School, which is a small school district, charges 50¢ for high school lunches. Chippewa Hills students eat lunch for 2/3 less than students at a small school

district. Also the salaries paid many of our teachers is below the average paid in surrounding areas. We have a very fine teaching staff, and most I have come in contact with seem above average. We are very fortunate to get good

teachers at our pay scale. Lastly, we all know that nothing can live without growing. Growing is the healthy, Natural way of life and development for people, business, and yes even for schools. If we are to continue to have a good basic educational environment for our young people we will have to keep up with normal growth, which includes rising costs in every field, and repair on buildings. We do not need to be in favor of a lot of extras, but we do need to be in favor of the basics, and that is what the upcoming election is all about. It concerns the basics for growth if we are to continue to be a healthy school district. Let's make the most of our circumstances. Get out and vote on March 12. A yes vote means you will still only be paying \$24.00 on school taxes for every \$1,000.00 assessed valuation.
