THREE TOWNSHIPS GIVE UP ONE FOURTH OF CHIP HILLS DISTRICT TAX MONIES

Three townships in Isabella County contribute over a quarter of the total real estate tax take in the Chippewa Hills School District.

They are as follows, with real estate equalized valuation (for taxation purposes) compiled for 1973:

Coldwater Township, \$2,670,-341. Sherman Township, \$7,187-400. Broomfield, \$4,629,486.

This is more than a quarter of the total tax take of the school district, which is totaled at \$58,024,371. The Chippewa Hills district

The Chippewa Hills district also goes into Gilmore, Nottawa and Deerfield Townships, and their equalized valuation for 1973 are:

Gilmore, \$3,749,400. Nottawa, \$5,695,550. Deerfield, \$6,023,241.

In the far-flung school district which stretches through three counties, the relatively small strip of Isabella County is providing a large part indeed of the total tax take of the school.

Revenues and expenditures have climbed steadily every year of the huge district's existence.

In 1969-70, for instance, the school took in \$1,422,066 and spent \$1,351,398.

'n 1970-71 it took in \$1,617,-791, and spent \$1,598,960.

In 1971-72 the school garnered \$1,849,686 and spent \$1,848,-669.

Note that during those years the school's budget stayed in the black, but from there on it began overspending, or going in the red.

In 1972-73 the tax take was \$2,053,565, and the Board and Administration, under the superintendency of Lavern Alward, spent more than it took in. In the 1973-74 figures, estimated, the tax income is \$2,308,136, with expenditures figured atsurprise!--\$2,308,136.

Ed was patient through it all, though obviously bored. Jeff worked on Ed's hoof with professional skill, ignoring the potential of that huge foot and leg if Ed had decided to "step on it".

Jeff entered the Michigan School of Horseshoeing Jan. 15 of this year and completed an intensive 10-week course in the trade of horse shoeing. He hopes to make his living in that very skilled trade.

His course at the Bellville horseshoeing school included a complete schedule of gas and arc welding, one in the anatomy of horses, specializing on the hoof and leg. There were about 10 highly skilled details in his over-all course at the school.

Jeff attended the Chippewa Hills High School up to the 11th grade, which he completed last year and dropped out. He wanted to learn to shoe horses, so he entered the very specialized school at Bellville.

While there he attained the highest rating of any student in the school's eight-year history.

At the school he trimmed the hooves of the nation's No. 1 "park" horse, the best horse in the country, rated for conformation, gait, etc. Owners have high competition for the honor of the position of "park" horse at races.

Jeff also shod the nation's thirdranked park horse while at the school.

He is happily married and lives two miles west of M-66 on 19-Mile Road, near Barryton.

WEIDMAN KIDS ON DRUGS: YES, BUT NOT LIKE DETROIT

In a front-page story by Darlene Kwiatkowski in the issue of March 21, the Mt. Pleasant Daily Times-News said, "Police Confirm Extensive Abuse," and quoted Les Bonstelle, CMU Department of Public Safety, as saying, "Central Michigan University has all the drugs you could find on the streets of Detroit. But we're not unique. You can find the same thing in Weidman or across the state."

The story raised the hackles of some Weidman residents, and the Messenger undertook to call the Sheriff's office and ask if Weidman is indeed an unusually tough problem, drug-wise. We

drew a laugh.

"Weidman is no more of a drug problem than any other town or place in the county," Sheriff Don Gillis said. "Sure, you've got kids on drugs over there, but it's not the kind of drugs you'd find on the streets of Detroit. It's mainly mescaline, marijuana, some LSD. But not the kind of drugs you'd find on the streets of Detroit."

Asked if the main drug use is among school children, Sheriff Gillis said it is.

Sheriff Gillis said drug use may cost the user from \$25 to \$50 per day, depending on the depth of usage. Asked how school kids could support such expenses, he replied, "Where do you think all the larcenies and burglaries originate?"

We called Mr. Bonstelle at Central Michigan University and asked him how come he singled out Weidman in his mention of problem towns.

"I didn't," he said. "The paper quoted me out of context. I did mention Weidman, but I also mentioned Farwell, Clare, Sault Ste. Marie, others perhaps. The paper quoted me out of context.

"I'm sorry if I offended Weidman people," Bonstelle continued. "There wasn't meant to be any significance in the mention of your town. My wife and I have many friends over there, and I certainly didn't mean to slander Weidman."

HOW HE VOTED

Here is a partial record of recent voting in the Michigan House of Representatives by John Engler, our boy in Lansing:

On a House Joint Resolution calling for a state-wide referendum on a constitutional amendment to give 18-year-olds the right to run for the legislature and for the governor's office, our John voted Yes. (Reminds us of a recent letter in the Chippewa Hills Schools' mouthpiece, the Chippewa Hills Courier, by a 16-year-old girl giving us taxpayers what-for if we didn't give her a Yes vote on the millage demanded by the School Board). All we need is an 18year-old legislator and/or an 18-year-old governor in Michigan. We repeat, our John voted Yes for a referendum on this.

On House Bill 5624, a vote to concur in Michigan Senate amendments-bill permitting local units of government to defer all or part of a sewer tiein fee for a person in poverty. Our John opted not to vote on

that one. The bill was carried and sent to Gov. Milliken for signing into law. (It's getting to be much more attractive, financially speaking, to be "a person in poverty", than to be a wage earner paying income

tax.,
Our John did vote Yes on a
bill which would reduce the percentage of true cash value at which property must be assessed.

For some reason we cannot imagine, Our John voted No on House Bill 5469 raising penalties for cruelty to animals.

We do wish Johnny would drap round some day and explain these things to all us outland citizens, when he's not too busy speaking at Mt. Pleasant club meetings and appearing with bigwigs on radio and in daily papers such as the Mt. Pleasant Times-News.
