HOME PAPER FOR THE WEST HALF OF ISABELLA COUNTY

JAIL BREAK HAD THIS AREA ON EDGE MONDAY

Three prisoners escaped from the Isabella County jail at 6 a. m. Monday, fleeing in Car 373 of the Sheriff's Department and putting this area on needles and pins until their eventual capture in the afternoon.

Jason Esch, 21, of Coleman, Donald Sehl of Mt. Pleasant and Terry Cook of Farwell overpowered Dick Swanson, Deputy on duty at the jail, and escaped with nine guns, including two submachine guns, ammunition, and \$105 in cash. They handcuffed Swanson, ransacked the gun lockers, the cash drawer, and got the keys to Car 373 which

stood in the jail's garage. Esch and Sehl were trusties, allowed out of their cells to help clean the jail and do other chores around the place.

Swanson said he went to the cell area shortly after 6 a.m. to wake the inmates to clean the garage.

Esch went into the dispatch area, followed by Sehl with a shotgun pointed at Swanson. He took Swanson's sidegun and handcuffed him and made him lie on the floor. Esch also had a gun by this time, and as Swanson said, "With two guns point-ed at me, I did just as they said."

The prisoners gathered up nine guns, ammunition and the car keys and took off.

Swanson managed to get to his feet and dial the telephone operator, who called the Mt. Pleasant Police Department. A city patrol car was dispatched to the jail to free Swanson.

Sheriff Don Gillis said the trusties may have taken at least one gun Sunday in preparation for the obviously planned break.

The escapees evidently went through or just around Weidman on their route to "a corner of Clare and Osceola Counties," as other news media have described their final stand, west on the Airline Road and apparently thence north through the village of Brinton or its edges.

Car 373 was reported by a housewife and law officers converged on this area and to the north.

Another telephone call, from another woman farther north, sent lawmen up to the Lake (Continued on Next Page)

(Continued from Page 1) Station area and beyond, where the three finally were taken back into custody.

Two were taken at a cottage in a wooded area north and west of Lake Station, and the third was taken later at another cottage.

Involved in the chase were Sheriffs' officers from this and other counties, State Police from the Mt. Pleasant and other posts, and the DNR Conservation Department, the latter presumably knowing the whereabouts of recreation cot-te tages in that area.

News reports and Sheriff's of fice accounts consistently gave the location of the capture as "at the Clare and Osceola County line," which would place it somewhere west of Lake Station.

All three men are considered hardened and dangerous, according to officers' descriptions.
Esch and Sehl were caught

without gunfire, while Terry Cook eluded police and a tracking dog--for a while. The dog finally chased him up a tree while a police helicopter hovered overhead.

The three men were captured in eight hours after their earlymorning escape.

Esch was in jail on a charge of carrying concealed weapons, auto theft, and breaking and entering.

Cook had a breaking and entering charge against him, an assault and battery charge, and writing bad checks.

Sehl was in jail for breaking and entering.

All three were reported in the maximum security section of the jail after their capture.

Housewives over this entire area kept their doors locked all during the eight hours of suspense Monday. Friends telephoned friends to warn them of the proximity of the escapees.

"I don't blame them," Sheriff Gillis said after the capture Monday afternoon. "Our great fear was that they might take a family hostage, and that would have been tragic." ---0-



Named to the committee were Dr. William Boyd (chairman), president of Central Michigan University; Allen Morrow, John Seator, Constance Smith, David Thompson, Kenneth Torgerson and K.P. Wood.

The committee was charged by the Commissioners with responsibility to provide information and give direction to these areas: Facilities, administration, and method of financing.

The Commissioners asked if it is feasible to conduct two

building programs on the same site, and whether or not economy and efficiency might be achieved by a combined program.


The Commissioners asked the same question about administration of the two facilities.

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


