SO WE IGNORE NATIONAL WOES A MOMENT, AND REMEMBER OLD TIMES

So let's ignore the very real dangers, illnesses and problems facing the nation, and remem-ber something of how it was back when the Democrats lambasted the Republicans and that was that. No national scandals (or at least, no national scandals that went unpunished); no world-wide threat of inflation out of control and at the same time famine in some places.

Let's look back to the 1930s, when we were in the depths of a Depression and thought the country would never stand erect again. (It took a war to stop that depression, but that's not our argument--at this moment.)

No; let's consider some of the more placid moments of that era, between wondering where the rent and grocery money was coming from.

Let's listen to Bill Louisell, Isa-bella County Grand Champion checkers player:

"I've played a lot of checkers with a lot of people around here, but I think I've played the most with Dick Rhode.

"I remember back in the early 1903, Mt. Pleasant had a very strong checkers club, and they got the world's champion checkers player Banks there.

"Believe it or not, Dick and I got a chance to play against him -of course we never had a chance--he was wonderful!

"But it was kind of wonderful, playing at the Elks Club in Mt. Pleasant, with the world champion player!"

Today, Bill says he's played a lot of checkers with local men, including Bernard Pitts, Mick Schmalbach, Harold Rhode, and others. Listen to Bill:

"When I first came to Weidman in 1931, I noted that most business places had checker boards. So, to be popular, I got one, too. Business wasn't very good, so we had lots of time to play the game.

"So that's what started me off. I just had to learn or throw the



Editor's Mail HERE'S HOW OUR TELEPHONE BILLS USED TO APPEAR Mrs. Connie Skinner

In the

We are writing concerning the method of billing for service back 30 years ago when Jennie Sprague first started as an agent with us.

The method was called "stub billing," and was quite different from what we have today. Once each month, our accounting department would "generate" a one-page, four-section statement. The word "generate" meant that a pre-printed form would be run through an addressograph machine. The addressograph plates contained the customer's name, address, telephone number and the local service charge.

These plates were updated as there was service order activity which would change the name, address, telephone number or local service billing.

After the billing forms had been addressed, they were forwarded to the local billing office (Mt. Pleasant). The local office would compute the locally originated long-distance charges from the tickets generated by the operators. This total was hand written in ink on a blank on the bill. Any collect calls, third-number calls (calls made away from home but billed to the home phone) would be forwarded to the Mt. Pleasant office for inclusion with the other long-distance billing.

Next, any installation charges, directory advertising or other locally originated billing would be hand-written in blanks provided. If there was a balance carried forward, it was handwritten in the space designated for it.

All items were then totaled and hand-written into the space marked total.

When the above was complete, the long-distance tickets and two sections of the billing statement were mailed to the customer.

When making payment in person, the customer would present both sections to be marked paid, leaving one with the clerk and keeping the other for their records.

When mailing their payment, the customer would send the office portion and again keep one copy for his records.
