FOR MICHIGAN WEEK.... WE VOTE FOR VILLAGE PRIDE

So this is Michigan Week, and we take this occasion to point out the satisfaction of having a "home town".

We have a strong background of heritage here in Weidman, beginning with a young man (John Weidman) who looked over second-cutting pines, hardwoods and cedars in Coldwater, Sherman and Nottawa Townships in 1893, and forthwith built a sawmill and dam at the junction of the Coldwater River and Walker Creek.

From that beginning the Village of Weidman has grown, burned down, rebuilt, survived, and prospered; until today Weidman is the center of trading for the whole kit and bilin' of manmade lakes now surrounding it, including John Weidman's mill pond, which he created for the sole purpose of holding logs for his mills (he had three).

Today the mill pond is a beautiful lake, renamed Lake Weidman; and we also have Lake of the Hills, right smack in the village; Lakes Windoga and Minnetonka on the Ojibwa Recreation spread adjacent; and then there's Lake Isabella, not yet, at least, self-sufficient as to shopping centers; and of course our old friends at Coldwater Lake. So Weidman is sitting pretty, in the middle of resort develop-

the middle of resort developments.

So we personally have no patience with zealots working to erase home-town consciousness both in our school children and their elders and substitute an umbrella-type commune known as the Chippewa Hills School

Development Area.

We even have a Chippewa Hills Industrial Development Corporation, composed of big-money folks from all the towns involved in the far-flung school district.

We see nothing wrong in being tied emotionally and thankfully to one's home town. We see instead a need for recognition of the home town as a place to

NORTH WOODRUFF ROAD JUST OUT OF WEIDMAN--Was under flood conditions Friday and Saturday as a result of the torrential rainstorms that swept most of the state. The overspillage on Woodruff Road occurred at the point of the big tube lying under the road, to drain waters from the west side of the Mill Pond over to the east side and thence to the dam and on down the Coldwater River. Cars went through the water, which was over a foot deep and swirling with the force of the flood waters behind it. Fish were seen crossing the road from the east side of the Pond to the west, during the flood period. Most of Isabella County suffered heavy damage to roads and bridges. Most farmers' fields are still to wet for corn planting, now delayed dangerously.

OHIO FOLKS HAVE TAX AND

NUISANCE PROBLEMS, TOO (Editor's Note: The following is a letter from Howard and Olive Johnson, who live at Fremont, Ohio, and formerly lived here. Howard is a son of Mrs. Catherine Johnson, so he is vitally interested in Michigan's tax and crime problems, but points out that we are not alone.)

Fremont, Ohio

April 11, 1974 Dear Connie: No charges have been filed as yet against the man in the clipping enclosed. (He shot out four tires of an automibile after his immediate residential area had suffered harassment by persons in autos at night.)

When you folks were having your problems with the reappraisal of your real estate taxes, we also were having them. Our county spent more than \$60,000.00 in 1972, and now this is our outcome. I thought you might like to read (in enclosed newspaper clippings) just what our county auditor, Zene Smith, has done --at least, he is fighting for the people.

(Editor's Note: He refused to raise real estate taxes in his county in Ohio, and was being threatened by state tax officials.

It's sad to read all about the vandalism that is taking place in Weidman, like everywhere else. Well, I'm sending you a clipping (I did have two others, but have mislaid them.)

Some people here have gone back to the frontier days. Now this is the third shooting incident of late.

Our first one was, this farmer had called the sheriff several times on young boys stealing his gas. Well he finally got tired of calling, and one night he shot both boys, 14 and 16, right in their rear ends and both legs (with buckshot). Both of them were in the hospital for a while having the buckshot removed. The parents, as yet, have not filed charges, as they were told the boys could be sent away to the "Boys' Industrial School".

On the other shooting, Wilbur Johnson, who lives on a deadend road, and he works for the City of Fremont—every night up until the early morning hours, cars kept turning around in his driveway, blowing their horns

and so on. He called the sheriff several times, and not too long ago he took his . 38 and shot at one car, toward the tires. The bullet went through the car and into a young girl's back (she was driving) and she had to have surgery, but still is not able to walk. No charges have been filed as yet, against Mr. Johnson, as most of these kids were on dope.

These steps are quite drastic, but the people are getting tired of being stepped on by some of these young ones, and their stealing and destruction.

Now, we also live on a deadend road, and not too long ago some of these young people burn ed a house down three doors from us.

Connie, please don't think I am crazy, but I stayed up several nights, and had myself a nice stone pile. When they'd go to turn around, I'd be hiding in the neighbor's yard (in a large bush), and did I ever let the stones fly. I did break some windows in their cars.

Then I called the sheriff and told him what I had done. (He knew of my plans in advance. They were waiting for these kids to report to them (on broken car windows by thrown stones), but they never have.

We haven't had too many cars down here in the wee hours of late, and no more whiskey and beer bottles thrown on our lawns, or window-breaking, plus steal-

Thought I'd just let you know that we do have sympathy for all of you. There are still a lot of good young people, but we have some bad ones, too.

Do hope you and Frances are feeling pretty good.
Howard and Olive Johnson P.S.--We do know the man

who shot the kids' tires out. His name is "Happy Hilton." Some of these kids shot his pony some time ago.

I am enclosing a check to renew my subscription to the Messenger.

My daughter (Mary Starr) has been paying for it, but soon, if my present plans work out, I will be making Weidman my home again.

Not very many people left that I knew, but with two of my children living there, it seems the place to spend what remaining years I may have left.

Tell Frances that I will be in later for some of those BIG tomato plants. Being in the hospital last year, I had to depend on others to put in my garden, and missed those early toma-
