

Around 1,500 letters have been mailed to delinquent dog owners in seven townships of Isabella County, according to figures this week from the Isabella County Animal Shelter, which was designated last fall to handle owners of dogs without licenses.

The job of hauling in delinquent owners is a tough one, and a grueling one. The Animal Shelter is not properly manned for the task, but Dr. Donaldson, director of the Isabella County Humane Society, and the staff at the shelter are working more than overtime to get the job done.

Last fall the County Board of

Commissioners adopted a tough program for enforcing licensing of dogs, and passed legislation giving the proposition teeth, if enforced. The proposition has simmered down now to threats of legal prosecution in District Court.

Two townships were very delinquent in turning lists of dog owners over to the County Treasurer's office. They were Broomfield and Wise. Other townships came in late, according to the County Treasurer and the Humane Society. Only a few, Nottawa and Coldwater among them, turned

in lists of dog owners in their territories on time.

Isabella Township was under suspicion, according to last week's Times-News, because dog-census figures submitted to the County Treasurer's office showed only 42 dogs in the entire township.

The Humane Society, as designated and deputized authority, has sent 312 notices to delinquent owners in the city of Mt. Pleasant. The Society was working on mailing notices to Chippe wa Township owners during the past week.

Many will not buy licenses.
Owners are taking dogs to the shelter to be adopted or destroyed rather than buy licenses, the shelter indicated last week. About 20

percent of these animals are adopted, the rest killed.

Last Wednesday Dr. Donaldson told the Messenger that 10 townships had not been processed through the County Treasurer's office at that time.

Last fall the County Commissioners promised that legal machinery would be set up to enable the Humane Society to:

1. Take the list of delinquent dog owners from the County Treasurer's office and send letter to the owners, warning that licenses must be bought or the Shelter's truck would go out and pick up unlicensed dogs.

2. Pick up unlicensed dogs after 10 days of date of warning letters.

3. Give the dogs out for adoption or kill them.

At this time the Animal Shelter is sending out warning letters to owners of dogs without licenses after which, in 10 days' time, a legal notice can be sent the owners not buying licenses or

turning in their dogs, to appear in District Court in Mt. Pleasant on misdemeanor charges of owning unlicensed dogs, according to state laws.

COUNTY TREASURER SENDS DATA ON DOG LICENSING

The Messenger, along with other news media, received a county-wide accounting of dog "assessments", or listings, as turned in by Township Supervisors according to law.

Deerfield Township, with Burton Ward as Supervisor, turned in a list of 341 dogs, with 43 licenses sold. The amount collected for licenses was \$151.55, compared to \$134.10 last year.

Nottawa Supervisor Ernest Schmidt listed 187 dogs, with 76 licenses sold. Collection was \$275.60, compared to \$123.30 a year ago.

Sherman Township listed 149 dogs, with \$174.10 collected for licenses, compared to \$91.40 a year ago.

Gilmore listed 109 dogs, with \$218.30 taken in for licenses, compared to \$94.95 last year.

Coldwater listed 184 dogs, with \$57.80 taken in for licenses

compared to \$69.05 last year. Total county dog tax collections to date the first of June totaled \$9,245.00, compared to \$5,189.70 a year ago.

Burton Ward said he turned in originally a list of 354 dogs in Deerfield, and remarked that this was the most thorough coverage the township had ever had. (Burton suffered disastrous losses in his herd of sheep last year from killer dogs.)
