DEMOCRATS BLAST COUNTY COMMISSIONERS FOR NOT CALLING ELECTION

The executive committee of the Isabella County Democratic Party issued a ringing disapproval of the Isabella County Board of Commissioners' refusal to call a special election to fill a vacancy created by resignation in District One. The resolution was passed unanimously.

The Democratic committee concluded its blast by condemn. ing "the arrogance and insensitivity of the County Commission" per year. and by urging voters to "indicate their displeasure in a way which cannot be ignored by the Commission--at the polls next November."

The special election issue surfaced last year after the resignation of Ed Fox of Weidman and the appointment by the Com mission of Richard Lichtenfelt of Coldwater Lake to fill the vacancy. ---0---

PROSECUTOR ASKS PUBLIC TO NAME WELFARE FRAUDS

Prosecutor Robert Kennett has authorized six criminal warrants alleging fraudulent receipt of welfare assistance so far in a well planned campaign for a crackdown on welfare gimmicks, a news release from his office relates.

Along with his efforts, the welfare department of Isabella County is seeking the public's help in exposing persons suspected of fraudulently receiving welfare assistance.

A "welfare fraud phone line" has been set up, with invitations to anyone who believes he or she has knowledge of someone fraudulently receiving welfare assistance, to call 772-0911, the County Building's telephone exchange, and ask for Darrel Tower, support specialist for the welfare department.

The caller need not give his or her name. The caller needs only to identify the suspected recipient and give reason why fraud is suspected. All information will be kept confidential.

The County Prosecutor's office says every case referred will be investigated thoroughly.

The Prosecutor's office says that all cases of actual fraud uncovered by the crackdown will be prosecuted and reimbursement together with five percent interest will be sought. Michigan law provides for up to a five-year felony charge for fraudulent receipt of welfare funds.

In March the Prosecutor's office began an attack on fathers who had abandoned their families, thereby requiring tax dollars for the support of the families left behind. Court ordered support payments, as a result of this effort, have produced \$21,320.00

The Prosecutor's office turned over \$483.20 to Maynard Cole, director of the county welfare services. The money was recovered by the Prosecutor's office ' from recipients who had ineligibly received welfare assistance. Recovery was made even though the element of fraud could not be proven, the Prosecutor's office said. ---0---

### DOG LICENSE SALES ARE UP THIS YEAR

Sales of dog licenses in the county are nearly double this year over previous years, but there remains a large persentage of owners who have not licensed their dogs.

The "teeth" in the program adopted last fall by the County Commissioners apprently will have to be put to work to get many dog owners to either get licenses or dispense with owning the animals.

The Animal Shelter took in \$1,235.00 at its office for dog licenses in the interim February to June 10 this year.

They completed the job of sending warning letters to delinquent dog owners in the follow-

ing townships:

Coe, Lincoln, Fremont, Union Nottawa, and the City of Mr. Pleasant.

A hundred and ninety-three stray dogs were picked up by the Humane Society this year, as of June 1. Eighty-six stray dogs were picked up in the City of Mt. Pleasant during that period. Two hundred and eighty-nine complaints were answered in Mt. Pleasant during the same period.

Each category has increased since the above figures were released, according to the Humane Society.

During May the shelter took in \$219.00 in dog license sales. Shelter fees amounted to \$430 (rabies shots, fees on adoption of animals, etc.). Donations

amounted to \$82.00. Total money received at the shelter was \$649.00. 184 animals were disposed of (killed), including 48 cats. Two hundred and eighteen animals were housed at the shelter as of May 31, 62 cats and 162 dogs. Three stray dogs were picked up in Broomfield Township, three in Sherman, one dog and two cats in Gilmore, and four stray dogs in Nottawa. Three stray cats were picked up in Deerfield Township, along with one stray dog.

Fifty owners of cats took their animals to the shelter in May, along with 99 owners of dogs.

The record is much better than previous years, but the process still is not what the County Commissioners promised the public last fall.
