Enough of this column business about Weidman. Once again they're getting on me about the old home town. Seriously, it's fun to be ribbed about the village which I still love. And, I appreciate the paper. It's posted on the editorial bulletin board and I think all 100 reporters have read it.

Although I don't get home often, I think of the wonderful people who were a part of my life when I was in high school and working for you. In this day and age of big-time back-shop people, the stiff unions and tough operators, I find it difficult to keep my hands off the type. That's a cardinal sin in the union shops.

Two days a week I'm on page makeup and it's my job to see that the makeup men do the pages right. But I'm not allowed to touch anything. It's most difficult because I know I'm as qualified as anyone. I can still run a Ludlow which I learned at the Mt. Pleasant Times-News; I can still set type which I learned at the Messenger, and I know other things connected with composing rooms. Working for such a great teacher as you were keeps me knowledgeable on such back-shop matters.

(Editor's Note: Take it from an old-timer who held a union card out of New York, Chicago--and yes, Lansing!--It's true that back shop is back shop and front office is front office, and never the two shall mix. You're one or the other; so don't blame the printers for being jealous of their hard-learned skills. The last I heard, the union apprenticeship is five years.)

My main job during the spring and summer is covering all city baseball and Michigan State. I've made three trips to Florida with MSU baseball teams and they're great to me. Although it's on such a large scale, you still find people with small-town backgrounds. That makes it nice.

I've had two job offers with big newspapers but I don't feel I'm ready just yet. I love working at The State Journal, they're wonderful to me and the six sports re-

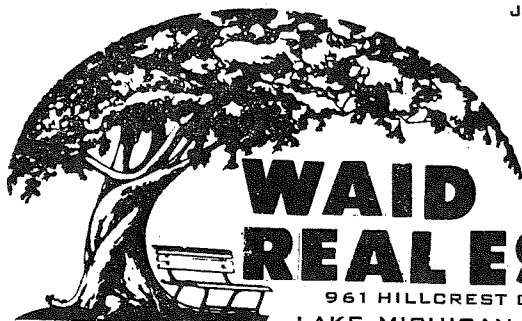

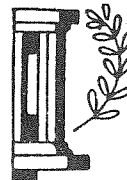

FIRST AID TIP IN CASE OF POISONING

Call the hospital or your doctor immediately. Dilute poison by giving person one or two glassfuls of water. Attempt to have person vomit, unless person is unconscious or having fits, or has swallowed of either a strong corrosive such as lye, or containing kerosene, gasoline or other petroleum distillates.
