
But a wood fire in Ma's old kitchen cook-stove--ahhh!

SPECIAL CLINIC FOR MEASIES IMMUNIZATION

A special immunization clinic for persons in Isabella County who need to be immunized against measles will be held by the Central Michigan District Health Department from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. this week Thursday, Feb. 5, at the health department's main office, 1222 North Drive, in Mt. Pleasant.

The clinic is being held for those persons who did not get immunized during last week's measles campaign in Shepherd, Sacred Heart, Beal City and Mt. Pleasant High Schools. The clinic is particularly geared to elementary and Junior High School students in the county who are susceptible to hard measles.

Immunizations are needed by persons who: Had a hard measles shot before the age of one; had gamma globulin with the measles shot; have not had a shot for hard measles; or have not had hard measles.

Pre-school children who attend the regularly scheduled immunization clinics at the health department every second and fourth Wednesday are not encouraged to attend this special clinic. All minors must have a parents or guardian's signed permission to receive the shot.

Only immunization for hard measles will be given at this clinic. The next clinic for all immunizations will be held at the health department Feb. 11.

WINTER'S WORST STORM HIT SUDDENLY SUNDAY

A vicious winter storm hit Weidman suddenly Sunday morning about 9 o'clock, roaring out of the north with a sound like a mammoth road machine.

Snow had been falling, but gently, with no wind. That 50-milean-hour wind came with no warning and hurled snow, new and old, in horizontal blankets across roads and lawns.

It was a ground wind, tearing at ground-level spaces but not touching high branches of trees, at least not on our place.

The blizzard continued all day Sunday, with winds and snow unabated and temperatures falling to lows of 17 degrees below zero on some home-thermometers here.

County snow plows worked all day Sunday, with every man on the job until after dark, in the midst of the blizzard, keeping main roads passable and workable for Monday's chores.

Every plow was out Sunday, all day, according to Mrs. Gene Mc-Arthur, whose husband is one of the stalwart drivers of the monster plow-trucks that keep us on the roads in winter. Road workers (truck drivers) worked till after dark Monday also.

All area schools were closed, as side roads had not even been touched by Tuesday. Depths of snow on those side roads made school-bus driving impossible, and schools closed in deference to safety of the kids.

Primary roads throughout the county were kept open and were fairly passable, but continuing gusts of wind and snow made driving a maybe proposition for most.

The storm was state-wide, and practically nation-wide, but it seemed to hit Weidman with a special vindictiveness. No accidents were reported in this area, and no power outages (as of Monday night, cross your fin-



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JUDGE CALLS MISTRIAL IN ABBOTT RELIEF CHECK CASE

The 21st Circuit Court trial of a Weidman couple accused of illegally receiving money from the Isabella County Department of Social Services resulted in a hung jury last week.

The 12-member jury was unable to agree on a verdict for Jimmy and Joanne Abbott of Weidman. A unanimous verdict is required of a jury in a criminal case.

Judge Paul O'Connell dismissed the jury and declared a mistrial.

The case will be scheduled for retrial, according to the County Prosecutor's office.

The couple was accused of receiving more than \$500 in relief money from Social Services during the period of June 2 1, 1974, to February, 1975.

The prosecution maintained Jimmy Abbott was working during that time, and they failed to notify Social Services of the change in income.

The defense maintained the Abbotts did call Social Services about the income change in June 1974 but the department continued to issue checks regardless.

The owner has a post office box in Washington, D.C.

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
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
