JACK THOMPSON

The area grieved over the loss of another of our old-time pioneers in the death of Jack Thomp son. The family have the sincere sympathy of their many friends.

John (Jack) Armstrong Thompson was born Aug. 31, 1885, the last remaining son born to Adeline and James Thompson.

Five sisters, Eva, Laura, Mattie, Dora and Myrtie, and a brother, Will, preceded him in death.

On July 17, 1918, he was united in marriage to Ellen Neelands. To this union were born two sons and two daughters.

In March, 1968, his wife Ellen passed away, a little over three months prior to their 50th wedding anniversary.

He was a prominent farmer in the community all of his life, having been born only about a half mile north of his present home.

In the early 1900s he cleared the land and built the present buildings by the Chippewa River, where he spent his remaining years.

He passed away at his home Dec. 30, 1970. Funeral services were held at the Forest Hill Church of the Nazarene Jan. 2, at 2 p.m., with Rev. Donald Wolfgang and Ercil Williams officiating. Burial was in the Forest Hill Cemetery.

He is survived by two sons, John N. of Drayton Plains, and James P., of Weidman; a daughter, Mrs. Charles Wilson (Vivian), of Grand Rapids; nine grandchildren, and several nieces and nephews.



cafeteria. A meeting Tuesday night at Blanchard filled that town's school gym to overflowing

At the Weidman meeting, 42 taxpayers signed up as dues-paying members of the permanent organization (dues \$1 per year). At Blanchard, 65 paid their dollar each and signed as permanent members.

The feeling of the lowly taxpayer finally is running high, and it is against excessive taxation and irresponsible spending by elected or appointed officials.

The next meeting of the Board of County Commissioners is Tuesday, Jan. 12. If the Isabella County Taxpayers' Association is unable to persuade the Board to reject the GEM evaluation survey of property in this county, then the Taxpayers' Association will ask for an injunction prohibiting the Board of County Commissioners to pay the GEM Survey people the remaining \$70,000 promised them by the Board.

Never have Isabella taxpayers become so aroused as this socalled property evaluation survey has aroused them. At last the lowly taxpayer, who supplies the money for politicians, township, county and state, to spend, is getting up on his hind legs and asserting himself.

There will be startling repercussions if the County Board refuses to throw out the Gem survey. Possibilities are recall of the Board members by special election (and anyone who received a GEM Survey statement on his property will vote on that) to a real taxpayers' revolt, with land owners withholding taxes for three years.

This last would be disastrous to county and state government if a large segment of taxpayers put their tax money in escrow and withheld it from the public trough (pardon us! public coffers.)

Any way you look at it, the taxpayer is finally fed up, and perhaps even at \$150,000, the GEM Survey might prove beneficial in the long run for waking up the lowly taxpayer to actualities of county government.
