He was born Feb. 23, 1946, in Mt. Pleasant, and grew up in the Weidman area.

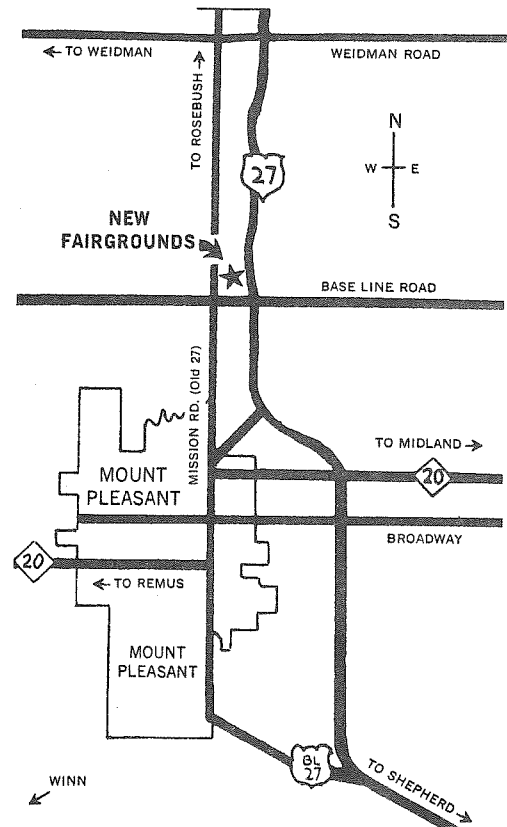
He is survived by his wife, Donna (Kent); three children, all at home: Karen, Tammy, and Ralph IV.

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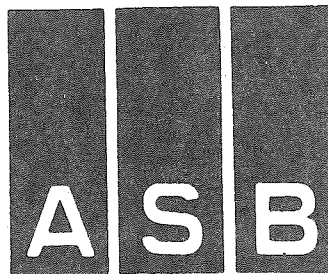

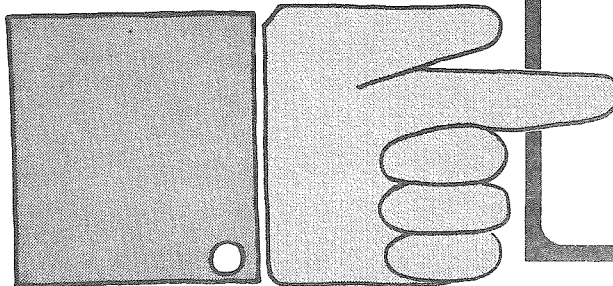
Meanwhile, it is usable for weddings, funerals, and family gatherings, besides such celebrations as Sunday's picnic dinner.

The next card party at the K. C. Hall in Beal City will be Thursday afternoon, Aug. 17.

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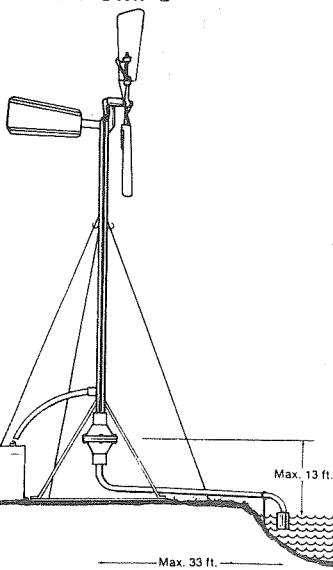

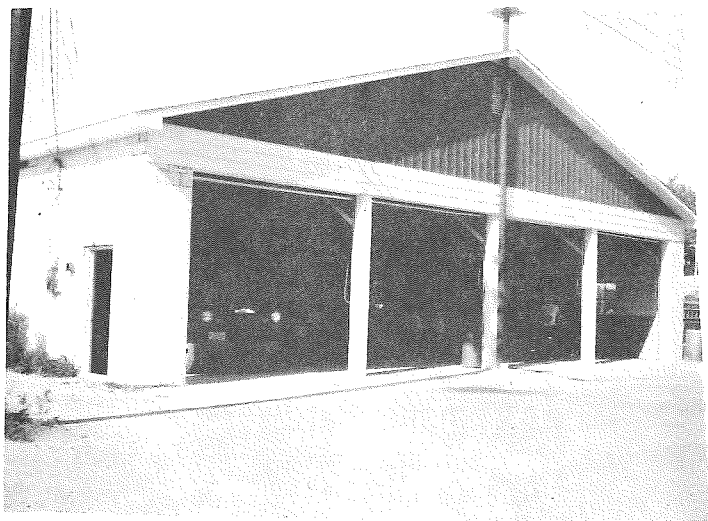
OK checkoff

Michigan asparagus growers have approved an assessment program that will provide funds for research, advertising, promotion to expand markets, and market information.

The referendum was conducted by the Michigan Department of Agriculture and the assessment to finance the program will not exceed one-half cent per pound, according to B. Dale Ball, MDA director.

Solargy Corporation introduces a pair of small wind-powered water pumps.

Many from the public sector also donated work on the new building, which made the Firemen happy, you may be sure. Spike Branson, Fire Chief, says he wants to thank them all personally for the hard and grubby work they've gone

through this summer to give the area a Fire Hall we can be proud of. Now the Fire Hall, remodeled inside as well as out, is roomy, and of course it's kept spick and span by the Firemen--at no charge to the public. Messenger photos

shelves for five or six years." "You can't move cats and dogs," I'd tell him, "unless you lay 'em out on display, special, at prices less than cost--and then it's a toss-up whether you'll move anything or not, if it's cats and dogs that've been on your shelves for years."

"But a newspaper's supposed to sell merchandise advertised, isn't it?" he'd argue.

Again and again I gave him the same old lecture: "If you want advertising to pay, you've got to have something to sell that people want. At a price that'll make them want to buy it right now!"

"Also, you've got to welcome customers--ALL customers--even

the pesky power-overs and the turn-up-the-nose snobs," I added.

"I'll try it once more," he'd promise: And proceed to list an interminable line of has-beens gathering dust on his shelves and expect "the paper to sell them".

The Roe family found out about that smiling business eons ago. (Accounts for our funny faces: They got cracked--many times--in the courses of our careers.)

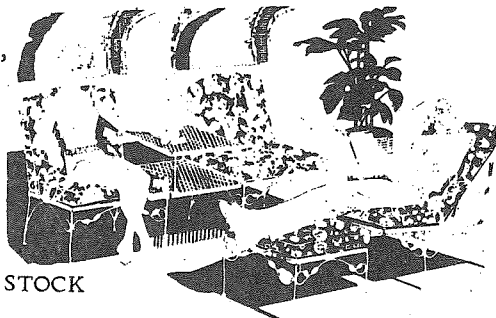
