By Connie SCHOOL CONSOLIDATION WOES: A NATIONAL PROBLEM

So we hear from Tarrytwon, New York, that the Chippewa Hills Consolidated District in Michigan is not worse off than eastern schools in supposedly sophisticated areas.

Seems that North Tarrytown, populated mainly by those of foreign extract, blacks, browns, etc., consolidated some years back with the staid and wealthy Tarrytown schools. Tarrytown proper is populated by prosperous whites, mainly investment fortunes and some high-class business people.

There's been trouble since the day the two schools merged.

Tarrytown and North Tarrytown (there's only one real Tarrytown) are not separated geographically; to go from one place to the other you don't cross any country spaces -- it's all built up into one solid city-on-the-Hudson.

But the two areas remain adamantly separated, Tarrytown proper and North Tarrytown.


They're in as deep trouble financially in spite of staggering taxation, as Chippewa Hills.

I've lived in Tarrytown, when I was young. Some of my friends were North Tarrytowners, and to us the boundaries, at that time, simply did not exist. You could live in staid old Tarrytown and have good friends in workingclass North Tarrytown. It didn't

But apparently it does today. The Rockefeller woods adjoined my brother's home-property in Tarrytown, and my North Tarrytown friends and I often clambered through barbed-wire fences and wandered about. But the Rockefeller woods were a great disappointment: They were just woods. Trees. The only difference I could see from my Michigan woods was that there were no wild-flowers there.

(Maybe they'd been pulled up and replaced by orchids in the Rockefeller green houses.)



K. OF C. ANNUAL FUND DRIVE FOR MENTALLY RETARDED

The second annual fund drive to assist the mentally retarded locally and in Michigan will be conducted by the Beal City Knights of Columbus April 1, 2 and 3, Robert Walton, Council Grand Knight, announced this week.

Last year, state-wide, the Knights of Columbus, a Catholic men's fraternal society, collected \$323,340 in a three-day weekend drive.

Localy, \$666.75 was collected, and donated to the Mecosta-Osceola Intermediate School District, Community Organization for Handicapped, Isabella Coun-

ty Adult Activities Center, and the Hoogerland Memorial Workshop.

Under the program, which is carried out in most of the 177 K. C. Councils in Michigan, people are asked to donate money to the mentally retarded, and given a Tootsie Roll candy in appreciation of the gift.

Eighty percent of the net income from the donations is retained by the local council, and the rest is forwarded to the State Council of the Knights of Columbus to meet expenses and make donations on behalf of all of the 62,000 Knights in Michigan.

The State Council recently do-

nated \$15,000 to the State Association for Mentally Retarded Citizens to aid the organization's citizens volunteer program. Other gifts are being considered.





Cost of the short course is \$14.50 for residents of the Mid Michigan Community College district and \$20.50 for non-residents of the district.


