THIS IS THE WEEK THAT WAS--OR IS?



They say they're doing real well, which is good--for them, and for the town. We need a restaurant here.



plumbing; Young, electrical; and also "a tremendous amount of church member participation." at all levels of construction-and it is still going on, the pastor


Special thanks were offered to the Weidman Bank, Abbott's Furniture, Fox's Hardware, and Allen Lumber Company.
