And it's all for benefit of the Sherman City Union Church, on which miracles of rebuilding and restoration have already been accomplished.


There's much more to be done, of course. The roof has to have a protective coating and then paint, and the sides have only a primer coat on now and will have to be painted.

She was born in Otsego, Barry County, Oct. 25, 1890, to Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Hatcher, who moved to Sherman City in 1901.

She attended the "new" Sherman City school, which was built after the first one was demolished by the famous cyclone (tornado?) of 1887. She was then a small child, just beginning school.

In a 1902 souvenir booklet given pupils by their teacher, S. Mae Hann. Ethel is listed as a pupil along with many others whose names are well known around here:

Julia Estes, James E. Soper, Mabel Rodgers, Clara Navarre, Celia Shook, Mary and Paul Bywater, Morrison Cameron, Bessie Tupper, Carl Shook, and many others.

Sherman City was already disintegrating when Ethel's parents moved there in 1901, as the timber was gone and sawmills and businesses moved on.

She was married to Mr. Abrahamson, and years after his death, to Will Bywater, and they lived in the house across the street from the Weidman United Methodist Church which is still the "Bywater house". She was a member of the church.

She is survived by her step-children: Burr Abrahamson of Mt. Pleasant; Gerald Bywater of Benton Harbor, Mrs. Jack (Gala) Fusner of Newark, O., Mrs. Ercel Woodward of Zephyrhills, Fla., and Dale Bywater of Midland.

Funeral services were held Wednesday at 1 p.m. in the Weidman Methodist Church with Rev. Vane Dimmick officiating. Burial was in the Sherman City Cemetery.

Friends called at the Lux-Rush Funeral Home in Mt. Pleasant Tuesday evening and Wednesday until time of the service.





A medical emergency division of Allied Health Programs, Mid Michigan Community College at Harrison will conduct a two-day workshop in E.M.T.-A skills and techniques which will meet present required criteria outlined in the emergency services division, refresher course, issued by the Emergency Medical Service of the Michigan Department of Public Health. The workshop is sheduled for two Saturdays, Sept. 24 and Oct. 8, with each day giving eight hours of credit to be applied to the retraining requirements.

Saturday, Sept. 24, presentations will be given by Denis Tons feldt, M.D., and nurses from the emergency department, Mid-

land Hospital Center.

They will address the trauma and pre-hospital treatment of chest, abdominal and pelvic injuries as well as pre-hospital treatment of injuries to the extremities. Cardiac, respiratory and medical emergencies will be included in the first day's agenda.

The second day, Oct. 8, a presentation on head, spine and cord injuries and pre-hospital treatment will be given by Dr. Tons-

feldt.

The remainder of the class will be held at the Templeton Auto Yards in Clare, with extrication techniques presented by Louis Sanford, Chief of the Sharon Township Fire Department of Worthington, Ohio.

He has been assisting Mid Michigan College the past three years with training classes for firemen, ambulance and lawenforcement personnel. He has a background in training of emergency personnel for the Vocational Education Department in Ohio.

The workshop will be held on the college campus except for the extrication session in Clare.

Sessions will start at 8.30 a.m. both Saturdays, with registration scheduled for 8 a.m. in Room 240. Fee for the two-day workshop will be \$14.50 for in-district residents (Clare and Gladwin Counties) and \$20.50 for out-district residents.
