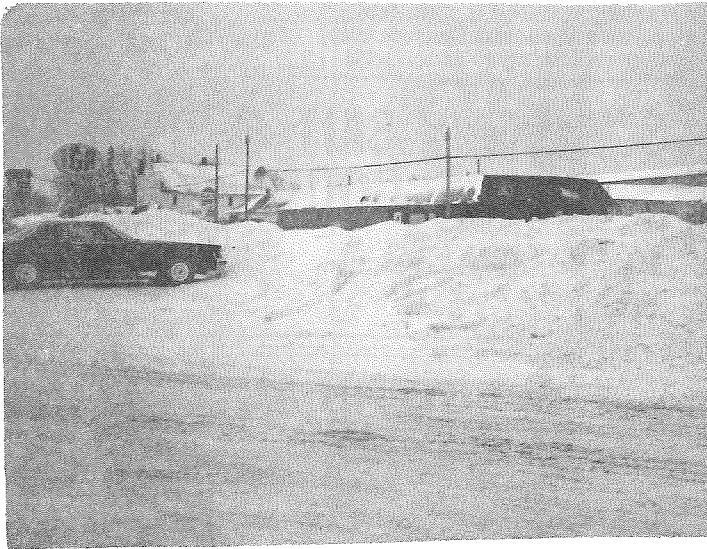

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**DETROIT WEEKENDERS HAVE NOISY TIME IN WOODS SATURDAY AS POLICE RING AREA**

Seven Detroit youths ranging in age from 15 to 19 years, had a briefly merry time Saturday afternoon shooting indiscriminately in woods on the Bill Wilcox place on Battle Road north of Weidman.

Bill Wilcox and his young son, Alan, were back in the woods on their farm, cutting firewood, when suddenly shots rained all around them, some frighteningly close, Bill said.

"We thought they were shooting at us," Bill told the Messenger reporter, "but they were just city guys out for a 'good

time' in the country, I guess."

The Detroit seven shot everything from deer rifles to shot-guns, and Bill said those woods on his place sounded like a battlefield.

Bill and Alan finally made it to their house and called Wayne Sisco, who alerted County Sheriff's officers, State Police, and the Conservation Department of office in Mt. Pleasant.

Eventually, there were two State Police cars, two Sheriff's Department cars, two Conservation Department cars, and Bud Klink's car from Lake Isabella, to round up the seven Detroiters out on a country spree.

Wayne Sisco said it was nothing more than that, just ignorant city youngsters letting go in the wild

open spaces.

Seems the group owns a 40-acre piece near or adjacent to the Wilcox place, and "those city guys don't know anything about where their forty acres begins or ends, or anything about country land boundaries," Wayne Sisco said. They have a shack on the old Joe Coolick place, which the group, or someone in or near it, purchased; and periodically some of them come up to let off steam in the "wilderness".

No charges were made against any of the seven, who promised to return pronto to Detroit, and to behave themselves next time, if they come again.

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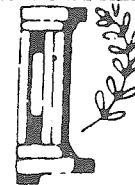

with Friends Project Council".

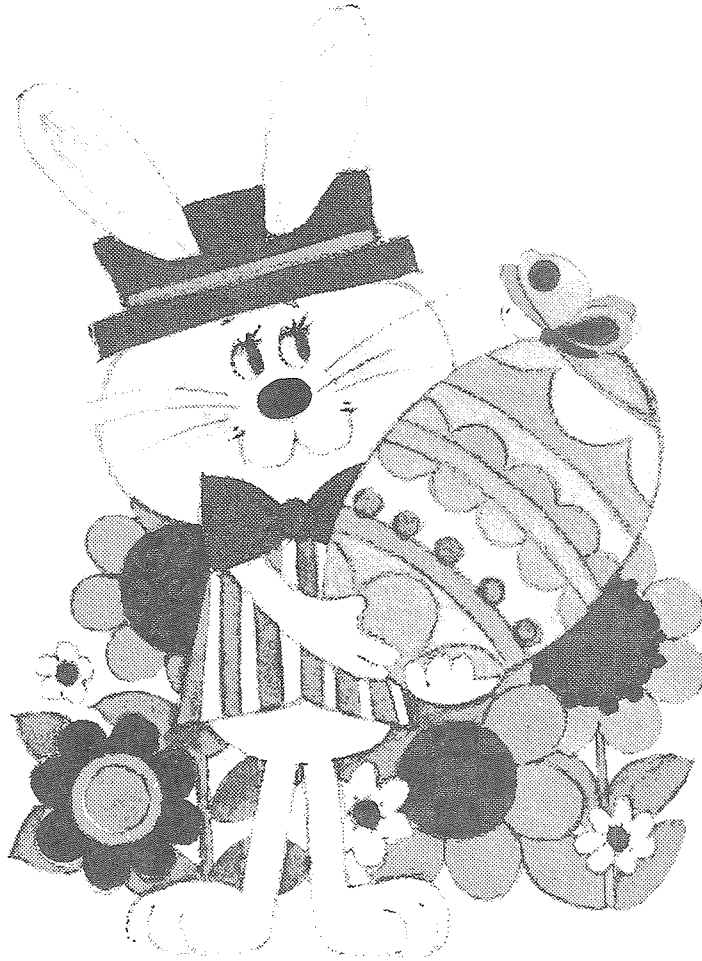
A farewell party is scheduled in their honor at the Weidman site of "Food with Friends" this Thursday, March 23.

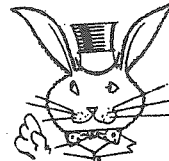

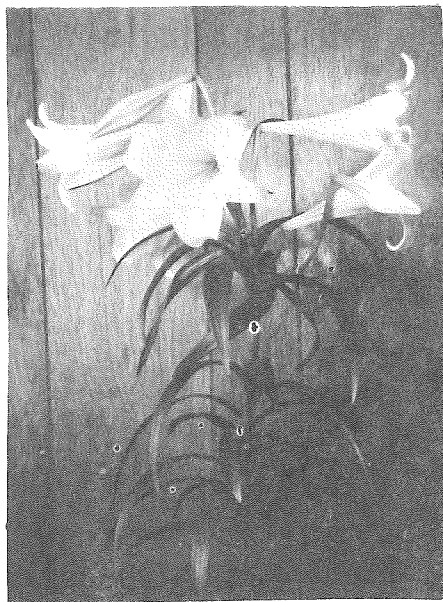

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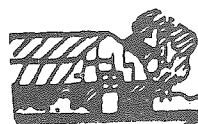
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
