Editor's Column

A BIG-BIG NEWSPAPER FOR THE BIG-BIG SCHOOL DISTRICT

We were honored with a visit by Clarence Smazel of St. Louis, editor and publisher of the "Chippewa Hills Courier Shopper," last week, and he reminded us that he had called once before suggesting that we give up the Weidman Messenger and join his big-big newspaper in the making which, he said, will cover Merco, Remus, Barryton, Weidman, and the Chippewa Lake School District.

On his first visit he had only vague suggestions as to arrangements in relation to the Messenger, and last week he said, "Well have you thought over my proposition?"

We said we hadn't received any proposition, and what did he have in mind?

After much deep thought he offered to pay "a reasonable price" for any of our mailing list "pertinent to his circulation area". All those subscriptions out of his "circulation area", he said graciously, he would honor by completing "the Messenger's obligations".

He offered Ye Ed from \$20 to \$25 a week for writing and editing the Weidman news for his big-big newspaper which, he said, he hoped to start publishing in about two weeks.

We made him a counter proposition: A hundred dollars a week for covering the Weidman area and a 10-year bond of \$20,000 to guarantee Ye Ed security in case his big-big newspaper folded within that time.

Mr. Smazel pointed out that he has the backing of the Chippewa Hills Schools and the Weidman merchants.

The Messenger will go on, despite other publications "covering" the area. Not since the days of Floyd Mitchell has the Messenger had the advertising support of Weidman merchants, so we are not terrified at this point.

Floyd Mitchell placed a weekly advertisement in the Messenger for the Weidman Bank, the Weidman Lumber Yard, and Holmes Milling Company. Since his

LANSING MAN ELECTROCUTED IN ACCIDENT AT COLDWATER LAKE MONDAY AFTERNOON.

Willis Owens, 18, son of Walter and Elsie Owens of Lansing, was killed when a television antenna and tower he was attempting to remove from the roof of a cottage tipped and touched a high-voltage electric power line.

The accident occurred about 1 p. m., according to state police.

His co-worker, Andrew Christle, 25, also of Lansing, was knocked unconscious but came to, seeing his companion dead.

The Weidman Firemen were called, and took their resuscitator over to the lake, but young Owens was dead by electrocution.

The cottage is located at 1313 Lake Drive, near the 4-H Camp at Coldwater Lake, and owned by Howard Hale of Lansing.

Willis Owens was to have been married to the daughter of Mr. Hale this Saturday, it was reported here.

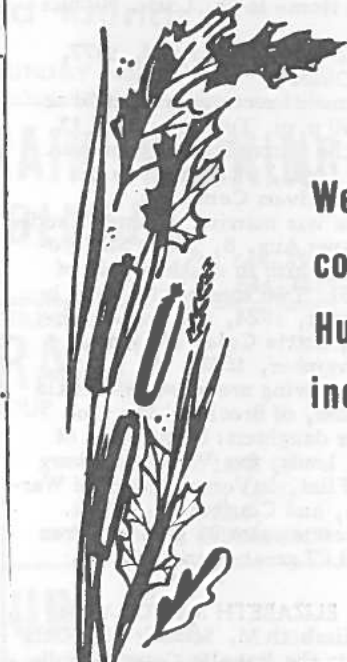
