We are in the jungle, about four or five miles from Cambodia. There's a lot of things happening now.

The slow period is about over, and the new offensive is starting. I don't look forward to it, and I will be glad when it's over with, or when the war is over for good.

Now we are in Puan Loi, about 10 miles from the Cambodian border. That is the place where the VC and NVA go to get re-supplied and rest up.

I heard that Nixon told everyone that we had a no-fire period and that we weren't looking for VC unless they found us.

Well, I don't know what he means. We are still looking for them as much as ever. We are set up in a place about five miles from the border. There are supposed to be about 500 VC and NVA holed up about 20 miles from us. We may have to go look for them tomorrow. I sure hope we don't find them.

You won't believe this, but I wrote a poem one night on guard. It isn't very good, but I thought you might like it, so here goes.

My tank commander got sick, so now I am the new tank commander for a while.

I haven't had a shower or a shave in two weeks, or clean clothes. I stink so bad I can hardly stand it myself.

We got two six-packs of beer today. It's the first beer in two weeks, and it really tasted good. If this notepaper is dirty, so am I.

I am so sick of C rations I can hardly eat any more.

I am glad you like the Bible (which he sent his parents as a Christmas present), and keep the packages coming.

Well, I just got word that we have to secure a bridge, so will have to go for now, so will say goodbye. Love, Steve.

Health Dept. Sets Rabies Clinics

The first of a series of rabies inoculation clinics will be held in the Community Hall in Shepherd, Monday, December 1, 1969. Dog owners must show evidence of inoculation against rabies before being issued a dog license for the coming year, according to Dr. Richard Nowak, Director of the Central Michigan Health Department.

This year's clinics are being held by Veterinarians J. D. Donaldson, Robert Spaulding, and Neil F. Sterling, with the cooperation of the Central Michigan District Health Department.

A charge of \$1.50 will be made for each inoculation. The proceeds of this year's clinics will be donated to Isabella County

Humane Society by the attending veterinarians.

Other clinics to be held in Isabella County are as follows:

Mt. Pleasant Clinic, at the Department of Public Works Garage on North Franklin - North of Pickard on Tuesday, December 2, 1969.

Winn Clinic, at the Fremont Township Hall in Winn on Wednesday, December 3, 1969.

Weidman Clinic, at the Fire Hall on Thursday, December 4, 1969.

All rabies inoculation clinics will start at 7:00 P.M. and last until 9:00 P.M.

DONALD THIELEN'S HOLSTEINS HAVE GOOD CLASSIFICATION

Donald P. Thielen, of Thielen's Goldenway Dairy Herd, reports that his registered Holsteins were classified for body conformation Nov. 17. The scoring was done by an official classifier of the Holstein-Friesian Association of America, Brattleboro, Vermont.

Dairyman enrolled in this herd improvement program receive a numerical score for each animal evaluated. The true-type Holstein represents theoretical perfection, and has a value of 100 points on the classification score card. Each animal is scored, receiving a rating of Excellent (90 points or more), Very Good (85 through 89), Good Plus (80 through 84), Good (75 through 79), Fair (65 through 74), or Poor (64 points or below.)

Including animals previously scored, The Goldenway herd of Donald Thielen has one Excellent, one Very Good and 12 Good Pluses.

To provide a more complete image of each animal, the classifier also uses comparative terms to describe 12 major parts of the animal's physical characteristics. This "word picture" serves as a guide for planning a breeding program to improve the herd.

The information from the classification of the herd will be summarized by the Holstein Association on its high-speed computer. Returned to the breeder, these reports provide useful information for selection in the herd. The data is also published, and available as reference for

the herd improvement programs of Holstein dairymen everywhere.
