In the Editor's Mail

(Editor's Note: This letter came to us Tuesday morning; and because we consider it of utmost importance, we are presenting it to you this week.

(The Messenger has been cut off from communication with the Chippewa Hills Schools after the Messenger has at times criticized some actions by the Board of Education, and also we have criticized some actions by Supt. James P. Jorgensen, Paul to his inner circle.

(Words inserted in parenthesis in the following Letter to the Editor are ours, in an effort to maintain clarity and keep the reader at the right meeting. Otherwise, the letter is unchanged.

(We hope there will be some interested parents and taxpayers who will heed the warnings and advice in the following letter.)

Dear Connie,

I'm writing this letter to ask that you please don't call me for information about what takes place at the Chippewa Hills School Board meetings.

Mr. Jorgensen has accused me of giving you information that should not be divulged (to the public). For instance, I should not have told you the names of the three Board members who voted against renewing his contract, or even what the vote was.

He also accused me of giving the impression of representing the School Board when I was, in fact, only representing myself.

He was referring specifically to the hearing concerning the request from the Chippewa Hills Industrial Development Corporation that the 40-acre plot of land owned by Chippewa Hills High School be re-zoned.

I attended that (zoning) meeting on my own initiative and stated that, although I was a Board member, was acting on my own behalf.

Mr. Jorgensen admitted that he had sent our School Board president and another Board member (Continued on Back Page)

The check was presented at a regular meeting at Beal City. It made the Beal City Council 48% over quota for Boysville, and before the meeting was adjourned, they had enough money to make it 50% over quota.

This is the third year in a row the Beal City Council has gone over its quota, under leadership of Elmer Rhode.

Boysville is a school in southcentral Michigan, for boys who need help emotionally and educationally. The school puts the boys through a high school education, then attempts to place them in jobs or send them to college. Ninety-eight percent turn out good boys, it was stated here this week. Boysville is totally supported by the Knights of Columbus of Michigan, and it is patterned after Father Flanagan's Boys' Towns in Nebraska. The boys graduate from regular public high schools, with no mention of their having been residents of a rehabilitation center.




