Editor's Column

WE'D LIKE A TOWNSHIP ORDINANCE, BUT IS THIS THE ONE?

We've been looking over a copy of a proposed Zoning Ordinance for Sherman Township, and we'd sure like a zoning ordinance, but is this the right one for Sherman?

It will be up to the people of Sherman Township at a public meeting next Thursday night, August 12, at the Town Hall at Horr, beginning at 8.30.

Under General Provisions the ordinance states:

"Except as otherwise provided in the ordinance, the lawful use of any parcel of land, building or structure existing at the time of enactment of this ordinance, although such use does not conform with the provisions hereof, may be continued."

That set us back on our heels, right at the beginning. Is the Village of Weidman to go on forever with no zoning rules as to junk yards and other eyesores detrimental to the town's well-being?

As one lawyer told us, "Yes, that first paragraph has to be in the ordinance. You can't just put a man out of business with an ordinance, you know."

We would say that the Village of Weidman has no thought of putting anybody out of business. The Village of Weidman wants adequate, high, boarded and painted fences around all junk yards and/or other eyesores detrimental to the town's future economic well-being.

We predict that unless the wording for the proposed ordinance for Sherman Township is cleared up before the public meeting next Thursday night, the town of Weidman will turn out and defeat the ordinance for Sherman Township.

As written, the proposed ordinance takes particular care of lake developments within the township. With this we have no quarrel. Let the lake developments get their protection; but let the rest of us also get consideration within this proposed Township Ordinance.

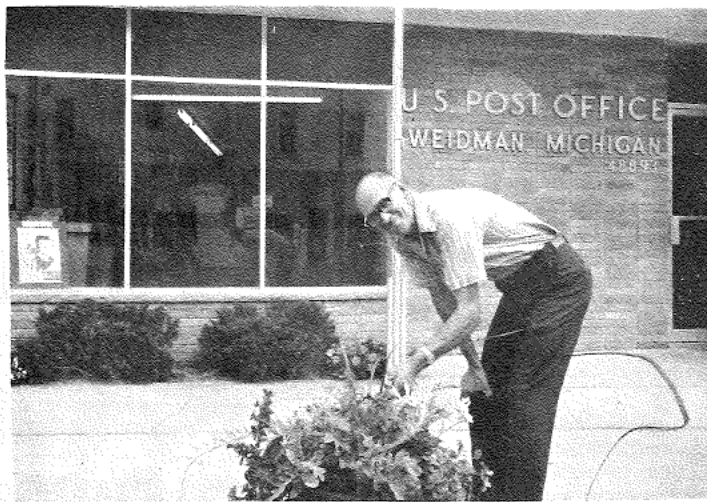

A, Paragraph 5, the proposed ordinance states flatly: "Junk yards and other use which presents a nuisance per se are expressly prohibited in a residential district."

Well, does it mean what it says, or does Paragraph 1, Sec. A (General Provisions) knock out that statement?

And in Article V (Commercial), Sec. D: "Junk Yards. All junk yards shall be two hundred (200) feet in rear of dwelling and properly fenced. This shall pertain to all private and commercial yards."

Again, does Paragraph 1, Sec. A, knock out this statement? Or do both of these statements pertain only to future junk yards and those already established must go untouched forever?

As we said, all the Village of Weidman asks is that junk yards and other uses which present nuisances per se be fenced so that they are removed from the public view.

Anybody going to attend that public meeting next Thursday night?
