Home Nursing Class Response Is Good Here

Eight women in the Weidman area have indicated they want to take the class in Home Nursing and First Aid being offered through the efforts of the Isabella County Red Cross at the request of the Civil Defense department.

Response has been faster than expected, and all women, young or old, from 14 years up, are urged to take advantage of this chance to acquire invaluable information on home care of the ill or injured. Anyone living in the west half of Isabella County is eligible for the forthcoming class in Weidman.

Costs will be at a minimum, it was stated this week. Main expense will be the textbook, which costs 60 cents. Mt. Pleasant Red Cross instructors will conduct the classes in Weidman.

It is desirable to get the class started well before school begins --started and ended, if enough women respond fast enough, Mrs. L. E. Going, of the Weidman committee, said Tuesday. Mrs. Barbara Kaninsky, the other committee member for this area, said it is indicated that many are interested but most do not realize that they should sign up at once for the course. It is a short course, probably to be packed into about two and a half weeks.

Anyone interested in receiving this free and valuable training may call Mrs. Going, telephone Weidman 2241, or Barbara Kaninsky, telephone Weidman 2912. Or the Messenger will get your name to them if you wish to call here. But you had better do it soon, as the quota will be filled as soon as the number reaches 16.

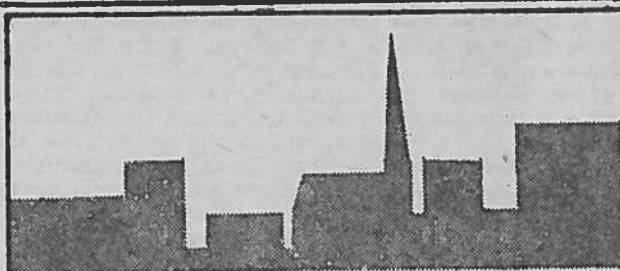

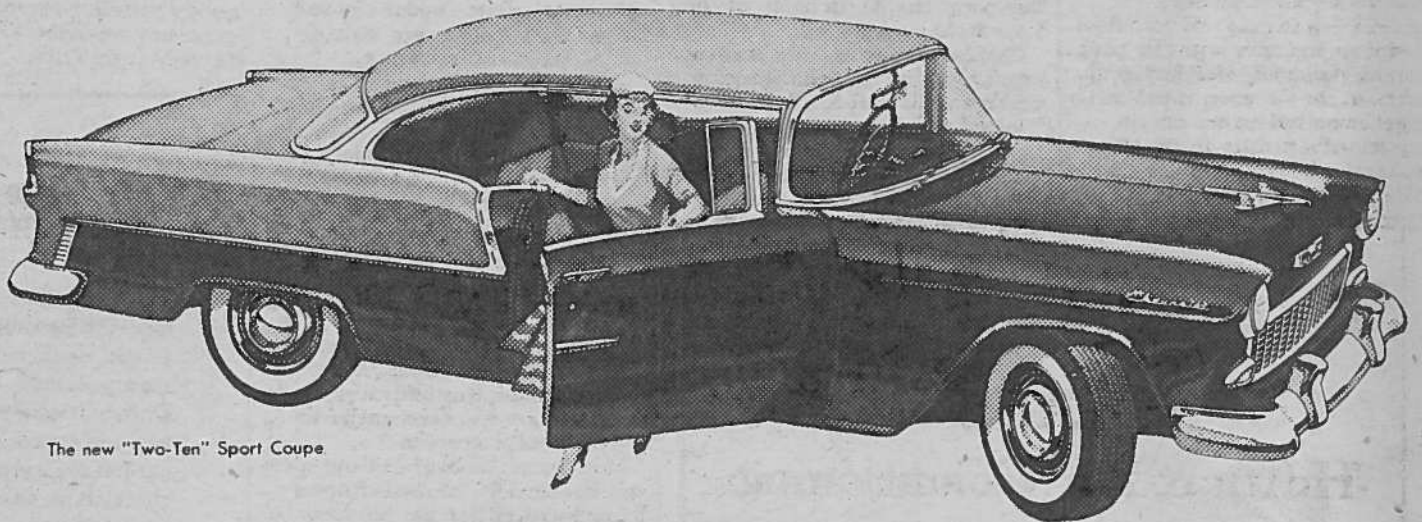

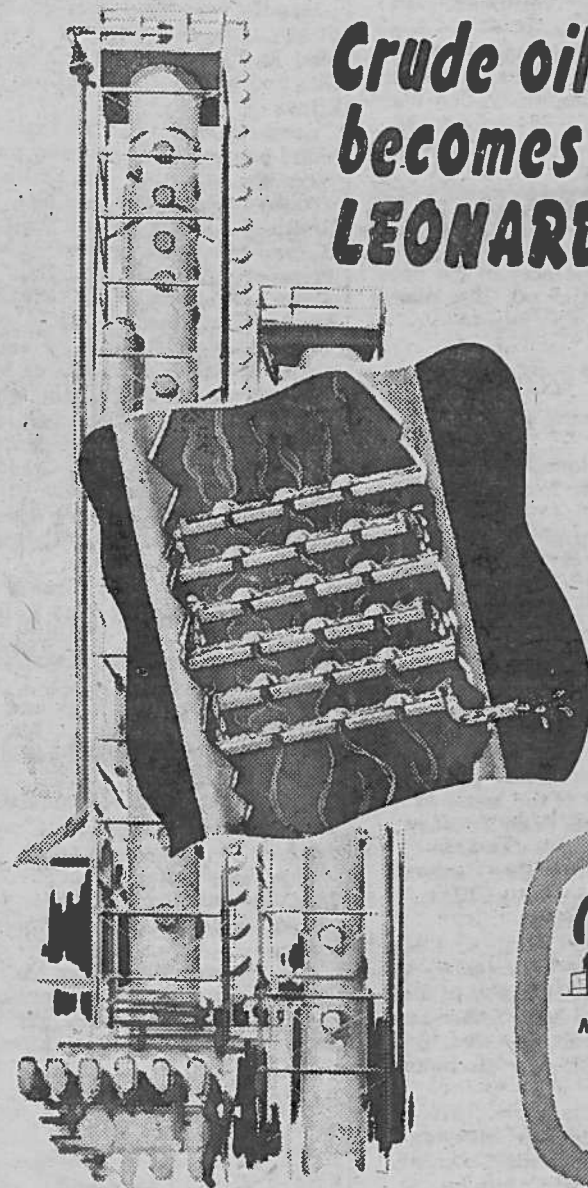
