School Starts August 29

Activities for the 1955-56 school year at Weidman will begin Monday, Aug. 29, with a pre-school conference for the teachers, Supt. Wood said here this week. The teachers will work Monday and Tuesday planning for the opening of school and studying and laying out plans for the year. The conference also affords an opportunity for the teachers to become acquainted with one another. A written set of policies and working procedures will be considered as part of the work of the pre-school conference, Mr. Wood said. Secondary students pre-register-
