Tries For Auto License Office Here

Miles Drallette has written the Secretary of State to apply for permission to sell vehicle license plates in Weidman, on the proposition that we are 15 miles from any place where they are available and should have them available here for our area people.

Miles received the following letter from the State Department:

Dear Mr. Drallette:

With regard to your application to sell vehicle license plates in Weidman, I am sorry to inform you that we cannot consider opening a new office there at this time.

Our present departmental budget provides us with neither the facilities nor personnel to properly supervise and administer additional fee offices. The only exceptions to this policy are in the very limited number of situations where great public need can be shown. The area surrounding Weidman has neither the population nor the number of automobile dealers which could justify the opening of an office there under our present budget. Moreover, the fifteen miles which Weidman residents must travel in order to purchase plates is only a mile above the out-state area average traveling distance.

If the situation in Weidman should change, or if the legislature should relent in its past policy of restricting our budget so as to limit the number of offices which we can open, we will most certainly reconsider your application.

Dear Mr. Dodge:

I am not familiar with what the extra cost would be to establish a new office, as mentioned in your letter, but I feel sure whatever this expense would be, that the Business Men of Weidman would be glad to reimburse your budget, so that they might hold a certain amount of business that is now detracted from here.

If you will submit the amount involved, I will gladly take the matter up with the Association.
