SHERMAN TOWNSHIP GOES REPUBLICAN AS USUAL

Sherman Township went Republican, as usual, in the biennial spring elections Monday. A hundred and sixtyeight votes were cast, with some deviation, very slight, toward Democratic candidates for a few of the state offices. However, the township went heavily Republican in all bal-

The township offices were unopposed, and the Republican ticket carried straight through.

Four constables were named, with only two names appearing on the ballot. Clayton Miller and Howard Wood were writeins. and Sherman Township now has these two, plus Ernest Loomis and Ye Ed, for this office, with Ye Ed turning the job over to the menfolks in a hurry.

Township officers for Sher-

man include Charlie Losey, supervisor, Flora Wood, Clerk; Mitchell McArthur treasurer; Paul Miller and Ed Fox trustees, Hazen Thompson highway commissioner, Clayton Dutcher justice of the peace, and Sidney Lawrence, member of the Board of Review.

Nottawa Township had both Democratic and Republican slates. The Republicans had no candidate for supervisor, everybody seemingly satisfied with Ernest Schmidt, who received 186 votes.

Julius Bierschbach was returned to office as clerk, on the Republican ticket, winning over Ben J. Weber, Democrat, by 172 to 137. William Fox was returned as treasurer on the Republican ticket, winning over Leo M. Schafer, 188 to 121.

Virgil Smith was returned as trustee, winning over Republican Norman Gross, 158 to 142. Republican Edwin Fox won over Clarence Schueller for trustee, 154 to 145.

On the Democratic ticket Joseph Streng won over Robert Bleise, Republican, for jus-tice of the peace, 152 to 150. Also on the Democratic side, Harry Pung won over Arnold Halfman, 154 to 146.

Bob Kirvan received two votes for constable on the Democratic ticket, while Ja-cob Weber received one on the Republican side.

In Broomfield Township, Don Woodruff, Republican, won by a 29-vote margin over Ralph Strong as a sticker candidate.
William Beck was elected su-

pervisor in Coldwater Town-ship over Clyde Wixom, Dem-ocrat. Clyde Forbes, veteran Coldwater supervisor, was not a candidate.

John Laverty, Gilmore super-visor, was re-elected over Kenneth Rawson, Democrat.
