FISHERMEN'S RIGHTS ON THE NORTH ROAD

Sunday saw the beginning of our annual trouble between the local Constable and fishermen on the north mill pond

A man from Rosebush, who said he liked to come to Weidman once or twice a week for fishing, was prevent-ed from unloading his motor-boat from the roadside.

His boat was properly licensed and numbered. He be-lieved he had some rights as a member of the general public, and he proceeded to investigate.

He contacted Sheriff Henry Craven and Prosecutor J. Allen Lampman, and the result was some interesting information as to fishermen's

rights along that north road or any public highway. In a conversation Monday morning, Sheriff Craven gave us this information to pass on to fishermen who wish to launch boats from the roadside:

Prosecutor Lampman said he could find no law forbidding the unloading of boats from a roadside, providing the car and boat trailer do not block or endanger traffic.

You can legally take boats with motors on either side of with motor on either side of the mill pond, provided the motor is legally licensed and the boat properly numbered with the license figures.

You can legally carry or drag a boat across the road, the Sheriff said, providing you do not block or endanger traffic in the operation.

The Sheriff had some sugges-

tions as to our use of the north road as a fishing site.

He said drivers should not stop beside a parked car there to talk about how they're bitin' as this constitutes double park-

ing and that road is narrow.

No cars may park between the signs posted each side of the bridge. No cars may park on the west side of the road at any

He said the public heretofore has torn up many of these signs and tossed them in the water. Of this we are duly ashamed. We hope the next vandal gets

caught at it. Sheriff Craven also had a suggestion as to youngsters bull-heading on that road after dark,

He said the kids dash back and forth across the unlighted road, and this, he pointed out, is very dangerous. Cars come down that road at a pretty good good clip, and drivers can't avoid kids if they're running across the road. across the road.

The road probably will be

closed to traffic shortly, according to County Road Engineer Ernest Bruce.
"We expect to begin very soon, perhaps next week, on that road, beginning with the installation of a tube there and raising the road's surface. The rest of the road north is ready for blacktopping now, after maybe a little trimming up. We'll have to establish a detour for the mill pond area while we're rebuilding there."

Incidentally, fishing has been good on the pond, de-spite east winds. Sunday's re-ports included 6 1/2 to 7 lb. pike taken, as well as good panfish.

Prevue of Old Days in Brinton

Editor's Note: This week we give you Tina Mae (Cherryholmes) Jenne's very interesting letter, or parts of it, as a prevue to our His-tory of Coldwater Township. Fern (Beers) Ellis is work-

ing with us on compiling and writing the history, and we expect to begin it within the very near future.)
And now, from Tina Mae:

I was born in Coldwater Township Dec. 30, 1888, and with my parents and the family lived there till the fall of 1898, when we moved north to the city of Cheboygan, Mich., and in February of 1904 we moved west, to the

1904 we moved west, to the State of Washington.

An older brother, Earl, and a younger one, Perry, were also born in Coldwater Township, Earl at Chippewa Station when that place was an active mill site, and Perry at Russell's Lake at the time L. Russell's mill was running there

A younger brother, Ronald, was born in Cheboygan.
My father, Cornelius Cherryholmes, who was generally known as Con C. Holmes, was a millwright and cabinet maker, and a member of the IOOF Lodge in Brinton. My mother, Matilda Cherryholmes was a Rebekah.

From Russell's we moved on to a farm, and Father worked for a time at Dad Fields' mill.

An older brother when four years old, and an infant sis-ter, both born in Coldwater Township in early days, died there and lie buried in the Conley Cemetery.
We moved into the town of

Brinton in the winter of 1896.

My brothers, Earl and Perry, and I attended the school in Brinton. My first term of school was intermittent, on account of illness, but I don't recall the teacher. La ter I had for teachers Mr. Jenner and Charles Gibbs.

In the year 1893, Brinton had between two and three hundred inhabitants. John Meyer was deputy sheriff.

There were, at that time, two hotels, seven stores, a good school house with between 70 and 80 pupils in attendance, or accommodations for that number.

A Union Church, a barber shop, one shoe shop, three blacksmith shops, and a post office with a daily mail. The IOOF Hall had the finest rooms for lodge meetings, and the Maccabees also held their meetings there.

Old Okemos, the Indian from down Lansing way, we found interesting. Not a large or tall man, he was withered of face, brown and old, yet his step was not slow or feeble, In fancy I can see him now, as then, coming down the

hill past the school house with his load of wares for sale: baskets, trinkets, and beads in his pack.

Since he was an Indian, we stayed behind a fence, and after seeing that Baby Brother was safely out of sight, we watched him trudging on down Main Street, and followed him with our eyes till he was lost to view

lost to view.
I recall the maple sugar parties at the Letsons' maple sugar parties at the Letsons' maple grove; the maple sap boiling in the large cauldrons, and at different stages, trying it in our cups of cold water or snow, for hardness, until in the final stage of sugar.

What fun!

RURAL MAIL CARRIER JOB OPEN AT LAKE

An examination for rural carrier for the postoffice at Lake Station will be open for acceptance of applications till May 13, the U.S. Civil Ser-vice Commission said this

Applicants for this examination must actually reside with-in the delivery of the above-mentioned postoffice, and must have so resided for one year next preceding the closing date for acceptance of applications. They must have reached their 18th birthdays on the closing date. There is no maximum age limit.

However, persons who have passed the age of 70 may be considered only for temporary renewable appointments of one vear.

Complete information on this examination requirements and instructions for filing applications may be obtained at the postoffice at Lake.

Application forms must be filed with the U.S. Civil Service Commission, Washington, D.C., and must be received or postmarked not later than the closing date.




