The Isabella County Board of Supervisors approved last week the application of Leo Gatehouse and Richard Tilmann to construct a large dam on the Chippewa

River southwest of Weidman. This is a huge project, and will add immensely to Isabella County's resort-lake offerings. A public-access parkway was stipulated in the dam application, and the public will be enjoying access to the thousand-acre lake if present plans go through.

Leo Gatehouse said last week that the developers now will move to form a corporation and obtain flood rights from three land holders whose acres would be inundated by the lake.

If such easements are not obtained, the developers would have to establish the lake 10 feet lower, he said, and the impounded water would cover about 500 acres.

Final state approval of the plans for the big dam is expected within six months, the developers said. Leo Gatehouse pointed out that the State Conservation Department has approved the project in substance, and now the department's engineers are con-

Alva Cummins, of Horr. Funeral services were held Wednesday afternoon at 1 o'clock at the funeral home in Farwell,



In past years it provided much entertainment for many older people, who could always be seen at the park when the teams were playing.


At the last meeting, three teams and sponsors announced availability, and at the mo-ment a fourth has been promised, which means that we will be able to operate.
