GEORGE DOES IT AGAIN--With a 42-inch, 19 pound, 2 ounce pike on Littlefield Lake Saturday morning. As usual, he went fishing. He caught an itty bitty bluegill and put it on a pike line. He sat in his fish shanty on Purdy Lake and waited. Presently, Wham! Away went his line, 100 feet of it. He had a fish on there. It really was a fish, too, as he discovered during 45 minutes of wrestling it in. During the process, the fish sawed the line on the edge of his ice-hole, skinning it down to a hair-breadth nylon thread. It was a 30-pound-test line, though, and it held.

**** Ice fishing on area lakes has been sporadic in results this winter, with some fishermen reporting wonderful catches of bluegills on Littlefield, on Six Lakes, on Tubbs Lake, on Evans; but if you scrammed next day to any of these reported fabulous fishing lakes, you came home skunked, or with a few small bluegills.

Cold weather and erratic freezing periods have been blamed for uncertainty of bluegill catches so far.

Last weekend, however, report had it that pike were beginning to hit--and George Skinner now believes it.

Two weeks ago he fan into a period of good catches of large perch on Littlefield Lake. Then those quit, and one or two fish-ermen on Littlefield reported good catches of big bluegills. That lasted about a day, apparently.

If the pike continue to strike, the ice fishermen will be happy to settle for the big fish. Most lakes in this area abound in pike, and the winter should be good from here on for that species.

George came home Saturday night with a mess of good sized bluegills, after hauling in his big pike that morning.

Others have been getting good catches, at times, on area lakes. Albert Geasler got two good pike on Littlefield Saturday, one a four-pounder and the other a five-pounder.

Weekend thaws saw a number

George Skinner was back on Littlefield Tuesday morning, wearing "creepers," and leaving his car on shore. Ice was estimated at six to eight inches thick on Littlefield last weekend.





Roe girls working on the Mt. Pleasant papers in the old days included Mildred, Lois, Connie, and Allys. Pick any one of 'em, we're afraid, Mr. Myler. We were all there at one time or another.

And, yes, Weidman was con-sidered to be the exact center spot of Michigan, until late year when some controversy arose and so far as we know nobody ever settled it.

(Editor's Note: Again this week we are happy to present Fred L. Kent's History of Sherman Township, from his priceless writings of 1914. The narrative takes up from our last instalment:

Of those who came in 1871, Mrs Margaret M. Tinker, Wm. Tin-ker, son of John B. Tinker; Mrs. Retta Tinker (widow of Amos J. Tinker); Endora Loree (daughter of James H. Tinker), are all who remain. Of those who came in 1872, Andrew L. Lawrence is the only survivor (in 1914).

From 1870 to 1875 but few came, and many moved away. Then the tide changed, and in the next five years many new settlers moved into the township. Among the number were Thomas Doyle, Winfield Bly, William, Jesse and John Thompson, Richard Alderman, John Burd, Wal-ter Lyon, George Waight, Samuel Pridgeon, John Beutler, Sr., John Hine, J.H. and E.B.Denslow Sr., Joseph and Stephen Losey, F.D. Woodward, David and Charles Carr, David P. Mecum, Wm.F.Sherman, Will Sheldon, H.M. Goodenough, Stephen Morey, H.D. Smith, John H. Putman, Philander Brand George Engles, Dan Loomis, Millard Pennington, Asa A. Smith, John Gatehouse, Wm. Miller, E.D.Adams, Samuel Kirvan, Wm.K.Gibbs, Frank Harrison, Martin Elliott, Andrew C.Divine, Silas Wright, Frank Rodgers, Sr., Charles Gardner, R.H.Gardner, A.W.Konkle, David Pruthero, L.J.Beebe, Wm. Cox, and Wm. Brooks.

Of this number, 16 are dead (in 1914), and many gone to other parts. We expected to state that E. M. Holstead had voted at the earliest election of any living inhabitant of the township at the present time, but his death on the 19th day of July, 1914, leaves that distinction to Adelbert S. Kent. Oscar E. Kent is the next who voted. Mr. Holstead voted in the spring of 1871 the others were here previous to that date, but were not old enough to vote.

There are two log houses still standing that were built in 1869, and are the oldest houses in town one on S. Kirvan's place, near the town hall, a cedar house in good condition. The other on John V. Kent's place, half a mile south of Horr, in poor condition. The former was built by Alexander Miller, the latter by John Kent, Sr.

It has only been about 20 years since the road was opened on the line north of Horr. The angling road across the flats was about the worst mile of road in the state for many years. It was a mail route from Sherman City

south, and yet it always remain-

ed a disgrace to the town. The people finally made a bee and chopped the road out on the line, and it has been graded and is now a good road. The writer is guilty of the following, which appeared in the (Mt. Pleasant) Enterprise newspaper many years ago. It described the condition of the road very well if it has no other merits:

xokokok

On a Sherman City street an old man was seen.

His locks they were silvered, his form it was lean. Long, long years ago he started

from Horr, Sherman City he knew he could

walk in an hour. But he slipped on a root and

down in the mud

Ha sank out of sight in the bottomless road.

He passed through to China, where the heathens abide, But the roads were far better

than he left on this side. And though the people were odd,

he liked their (high)ways And decided to stay there the rest of his days.

But when he grew old he thought he'd find out

If the people of Sherman had fixed that mail route.

When told that the road was still at high tide.

He said, "God forgive them!" and lay down and died.

Charles Taylor of Coe is the author of some interesting county history, written for the Northwestern Tribune in 1888, from which I quote the dollowing: "Isabella County was opened for settlement by what was call-ed the Act of the 4th of August,

1854, graduating the price of lands, and in September and October following a general rush was made for the cheap lands.

"At that time, January, 1855, a number of families had moved into the county, some had come in November and December, 1854. The first families to move into the township of Coe were Patrick Roberts, Patrick Fanning, Daniel Brickley and Willard Stewart."
