



SOME INTERESTING HISTORY OF NOTTAWA TOWNSHIP

(Editor's Note: Walter Russell of Mt. Pleasant, Isabella County's most devoted historian and collector, wrote the following piece and sent it to us months ago. It is taken from a July, 1884, edition of a "Portrait and Biographical Album" printed by Chapman Brothers of Chicago.

(While we feel that Chapman Brothers of Chicago had a good thing going in their historical and biographical accounts, as they were well paid for each biographical writeup and more so for pictures, we do believe that they accomplished an invaluable record of the situations and conditions in this area at that time, 1884.

(Herewith is the 1884 account of Nottawa Township, probably the county's richest farming area and one of the very foremost townships in modern achievement and progress today.) Isabella County has a large ac-

reage of valuable land, but in no part of it are there so many acres of spendid agricultural land in one body as are embraced in Nottawa Township.

This is still included in the Indian reservation, and most of the inhabitants are Indians. Some of them are in good circumstances and are amassing a competency. The remnants of the Chippewa tribe who are not actively engaged in farming are a lazy, shiftless set, who eke out a scan-ty livelihood by hunting and trap ping. Those of the tribe who live in the most primitive style and cling to their old superstitions. are numbered among the residents of Nottawa.

The township was named in honor of an Indian chief who bore the name. He was one of the most noble and honored men of his tribe, whose teachings were listened to with rapt attention by his people. He advocated honesty, industry and the Chris-tian virtues, and by his own acts exemplified his precepts. His death occurred Oct. 10, 1881, and his loss was sincerely mourn ed not only by his own people but also by the whites as well. He had attained the advanced age of 100 years, and until a short time before his death was quite an active man.
