#### Editor's Column

VOTE NO ON "PROPERTY TAX RELIEF" PROPOSAL

Joseph M. Grim of the Farwell News had an editorial last week that we think is worth spreading around.

He says, in part:
"There will be a proposal on the November ballot which has been called a 'property tax relief' measure. It is a wolf in sheep's clothing.

"The proposal was put on the ballot through gathering 300,000 signatures by the Michigan Education Association, with the blessing of Gov. Milliken.

"The proposal carries a thinly disguised property tax proposal which is cleverly designed to give you temporary relief while guaranteeing that in the end your property tax headache will return, even greater than it is now....


"Twice in recent years, voters of Michigan had decisively defeated proposals to give Michigan a 'graduated income tax', and the supporters of the original property tax relief measure wanted no part of forcing the homeowners of Michigan to accept such a proposal in order to rid themselves of an unjust tax. Neither did they want any part of the Governor's so-called 'education reform program'.

"Those who have carefully studied this proposal see in it so much that is bad and so little that is good that they are advising voters to reject both of these proposals. Better, they believe, to suffer the injustices of the present property tax for school purposes than accept a temporary relief, only to find that in the end property taxes for school purposes would be higher than at the present time. The joker is that the proposed 'millage' means nothing, because the State Tax Commission would merely increase the 'state equalized' assessment values. This process has been used all over the state to double the school tax on property in the past five or six years, and there is no end in sight....

"The Governor's education reform program guarantees that the local boards of education will be stripped of all control and that the property taxpayer will no longer be able to veto high (Continued on Back Page)



THE ABOVE VALUABLE RELIC OF OLD TIMES--Was sent the Messenger by Mrs. Edith Neelands of Pontiac. The Drew area southwest of Weidman was settled and farmed before John S. Weidman came here. Woodin's Mill operated in that area, and there was a school, a store, and a post office.

In 1884 there were six school districts in Sherman Township. A total of 139 pupils attended school in the township.

Henry Woodin came to Saginaw in 1853, where he stayed 16 years. Then he came on to Sherman Township, in 1869, and took up land, 1,050 acres of it, along the Chippewa River, where he built a sawmill. In the 1884 edition of Isabella County history Henry Woodin had 120 acres of wheat, a huge planting for that period. He had 200 acres in fruit. He had good farm buildings, according to the 1884 his-

tory of the county.

The Woodin land holdings are still impressive, and their history is part of the township's heritage.


