The Saginaw News went on to say: "Engler and Miss House, if the triple-residency scheme is carried out, would be spared the expense of living on two salaries but maintaining three homes. Both now live with their parents.

"Neither Engler nor Miss House could be immediately reached for comment on hints that Demo crats may try to break up the couple's House-keeping plans."

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

A newly organized La Leche League group in Weidman will hold its first meeting Tuesday, Jan. 21, at 10 a.m. at the home of Diane Benn.

The name, La Leche, is Spanish, and means "the milk". The League is non-sectarian, a non-profit organization, with purpose to help encourage "good mothering through breast feeding".

The group will meet the third Tuesday of each month. A series of four meetings will discuss on an informal basis different phases of breast feeding. The first meeting's topic is "Advantages of Breast Feeding to Mother and Child". Diane Benn will be discussion leader.

All women interested in nursing their babies are invited to attend the meetings—as are their babies.

Diane Benn says, "You need not be pregnant, or even have a family, to attend. If you are a wife and hope someday to have children; if you are a grandmother...if you are interested... you are welcome."

La Leche League began in a Chicago suburb 14 years ago when one mother who had successfully nursed her baby helped another who wanted to breast feed.

This is still the basic approach, though the League is now international in scope, with more than 1,700 groups helping thousands of women, in the United States, Canada, and 12 foreign countries.

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WEIDMAN SCHOOL OFFERS PRE SCHOOL PROGRAM

A pre school program initiated last year proved extremely popular, Harry Howard, Principal, said this week. The school is planning to provide the program again this year.

Kathy Shoemaker will be the volunteer teacher for the program. Mothers will be needed to volunteer help each day, Mr. Howard said.

About \$5.00 per student will provide milk or juice each day and help pay for some of the teaching materials. Donations from groups and individuals are

sought.
