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Editor's Column

By Connie THE OLD TIMES WERE SOMETIMES RUGGED

Wendell Roberts of Pontiac has brought us a copy of the July 14, 1905, edition of the Isabella County Enterprise, a weekly paper that survived for many years before finally succumbing to modern times.

We found the issue entirely fasci nating. The entire front page is solid reading-type, no pictures, very small headings on anything.

The lead-off column is about "Enormous Bridge and Highway Expenditures in the County."

It says:

"There were collected in Isabella County last year (1904) \$24,024 on the township tax rolls for road improvement. Added to this is the poll tax supposed to be collected or worked out and estimated at \$3,500.

Thus there is expended yearly in the neighborhood of \$27,525 for roads and bridges in Isabella County. Now the question arises: Does the public get the benefit in the least from the expenditure of so large a fortune each year in highway improvement?

"It can be said with emphasis that it does not...the taxpayers are paying for these rough, ill-shapened, mud to the hubs in wet weather and awful ruts in dry weather thoroughfares. Nearly all the roads of the county are destructive of horses, harness and vehicles and cost these same taxpayers many, many dollars more."

(Nottawa Township kicked in \$1750 in 1904; Gilmore, \$600; Broomfield, \$800; Sherman, \$724; Coldwater, \$783.)

In that same issue (which ran obituaries and country news letters on its front page), is the Horr news, written, we're certain, by the venerable Fred Kent. Here's a sample of his writing

Some County Commissioners are talking of a possible "executive secretary," claiming that management of county affairs by the Commissioners alone is im-

possible. County Clerk Betty Prout said she'd favor the executive secretary type of position, while Mt. Pleasant Commissioners appear to favor outright control by one

person. Commissioner Charles Epple of Rosebush was outright against the controller position, saying, "Before that position was established, that group of intelligent people (Commissioners and county officials) was running like a

sewing machine."

The issue of pouring in \$25, 000 of county tax monies to the Mt. Pleasant airport remained unsettled last week. The proposition met with stiff resistance. ---0--






