COUNTY COMMISSIONERS TO HAVE BUDGET HEARING TUESDAY NIGHT, OCT. 14 The Board of County Commissioners will hold a budget hearing meeting Tuesday evening, Oct. 14, at 7 o'clock in Room 124 of

the County Building. The meeting is open to the public. Weidman citizens are being urged to attend, as some items vitally affecting this area will be discussed and decided upon.

Commissioner Della Ŵalker said last week that included in the 1976 budget are five new cars and two new deputies for the Sheriff's Department (a Township Supervisor said the Sheriff needs four new deputies); \$25,000 allocated for spending on the Mt. Pleasant airport, where only private planes land and take off, their traffic affecting per-haps the City of Mt. Pleasant but not the County, and the spending of county tax monies on this project may come under discussion; the county controller, Rogers Morton, is scheduled to stay on his disputed job with an raise, to a nice \$21,000 per year salary

Éarl Oplinger, Ernest Schmidt and Lewis Bowen, Supervisors of Sherman, Nottawa and Coldwater Townships, are expected to be present as representing their constituents.

A contingent of Weidman folks is also expected to be present, in light of the recent experiment by the Commissioners in doling out \$900 for the Sheriff to put on an extra man in this area for one week--who rounded up more than 40 lawbreakers.

The detail of better law enforcement for this area is expected to be set before the Commissioners, along with the necessity and/or desirability of maintaining a \$21,000-a-year "controller".


