In 1943 I'd just sold a non-fiction piece to Satevepost, about three women "farming it", in which I said I had a Jersey cow.

I didn't have the cow at the time I wrote it, and when Satevepost bought it, I knew I had to scram and get a cow.

Like a gift of Providence, I saw an ad in the Mt. Pleasant paper, "For Sale: Registered Jersey cow, off-type. Hatfield Farms, Remus."

I paid \$150 for my registered Jersey cow, which my family considered a high price. But she was a Hatfield Jersey, and even I knew about the Hatfield herds, famous throughout the land.

Doc Clark went with me to see the cow, and the patriarch of the Hatfield family took us out to the night-pasture behind the barn. (They had pastures, in those days.)

Doc Clark said the cow had a hump on her rump; in other words her back sagged, and the Hatfields wouldn't have such a cow in their prize herds.

She had a pedigree of fancy names a mile long, but to me

she was Daisy May.

Daisy May turned out to be a character. She had never seen a woman up close before. Well, I hadn't seen a cow up close before, either—not that close, any how, so we were even. That's what I thought.

Daisy May objected strenuously to being milked by hand, and by a woman, yet! There were weeks when I never got a pail of milk from the barn to the house—Daisy May lifted a hind foot like lightning, setting it down squarely in the pail.

Eventually we got acquainted, and she had more fun than I did.

On rainy days when I'd go out to bring her in from pasture (she wore a bell, always), she'd hide in one of her bowers in the swale on the back side of the place, not moving a muscle, never making a sound. I could hunt for her till I'd accidentally come


