A LOT OF PEOPLE OUT OF ELECTRIC POWER BECAUSE OF OF VANDALISM ON LINES

On Jan. 8, this year, the Freeland Fire Department, the Tri-City Airport, two schools, and about 3,700 other customers suddenly lost electric power supplied by Consumers Power Company.

On March 12, this year, the Gladwin Hospital, the Amble School and the Wolverine Camper manufacturing Company, as well as 6,420 other customers, suddenly lost their electric power.

On Oct. 9, this year, the vil-lage of Stockbridge and the Stockbridge High School, along with about 4,210 other customers, were suddenly cut off from electric power.

Gunshots had shattered glass or porcelain insulators on poles that carry transmission lines supplying the distribution lines to those customers.


The public health and safety were endangered because a few smart-alecs with shotguns or ri-fles thought insulators on power

poles would make good targets. A total of 1,536 transmission line insulators had to be replaced after gunfire destroyed them, the power company said. This was 560 more than in 1973. The whole trend is up, over a period dating from 1970, according to Consumers Power.

"We would like to get the Department of Natural Resources, sportsmen's clubs, and conservation groups more involved in helping prevent the damage," a spokesman for the company said. Himself a hunter, he said that he believes that hunters are often wrongly blamed for the outrage. "The real hunters don't go in for that kind of thing," he said. October and November show

The company is offering a reward up to \$500 for information leading to the conviction of persons who damage company equipment.

The company is patroling lines to try to prevent the shootouts, a spokesman said this week.


"But I earned the bread," said the little red hen.


