NEXT AUDUBON FILM SHOWING SET FOR FEB. 23

"Footloose in Newfoundland" is the next Audubon Wildlife film program, to be presented by photographer-naturalist Thomas Ster-ling Sunday, Feb. 23, at 3 p.m. in Warriner Auditorium on the campus at Mt. Pleasant.

Astride the most valued fishing waters of the world is Newfoundland, the easternmost extension of North America. For the past thousand years, this Canadian province has witnessed the lives of the primitive Beothuck Indians, Eskimos, Vikings, Portuguese fishermen, Spaniards, British and French explorers.

The film is a story of Newfoundland via its history, people, and its wildlife. Included will be footage on whaling--some of the last of this activity ever photographed on the North American continent; fishing for Atlantic salmon and huge cod; spectacular Gros Morne National Park with fjords rivaling those of Norway; wild creatures such as bear, moose, gannets, puffins, and colorful sea life.

Sterling was interested in nature since boyhood in southern Michigan, traveled and photographed extensively in wilderness areas during his five-year stint in the Air Force, graduated as a field naturalist from the University of Michigan, and has produced natural history films for the classroom and for the Canadian Broadcasting Company.
