We wish the utility companies would economize a little on the epistles they send us explaining why our bills are so high, and also rising with every month.

THREE HURT IN ACCIDENT ON MILL ROAD MONDAY



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

The expansion fund drive is a tri-county campaign to raise a million dollars of the total six and a half million cost of a major construction program for the Mt. Pleasant hospital.

Located in Isabella County, CMC Hospital serves Clare and Mecosta Counties as well. Presently the hospital is operating under a qualified license from the Michigan State Department of Public Health. It was granted based on the hospital board's assurance to the department that the renovation and expansion program will begin in June of this year.

Funds solicitations will be initiated soon in Barryton, Beal City, Blanchard, Farwell, Remus, Rosebush, Shepherd, Weidmand and Winn.

Expansion plans call for adding 30 beds to the 115-bed facility to provide for the estimated occupancy increase for the next 15 years. A new three-story wing is planned to include a new lobby, surgical suites, laboratory, central sterile department, obstetrical unit, medical-surgical unit and intensive care-coronary care unit. Extensive remodeling of the current facility will enlarge eight other departments and expand visitor parking.

Funds for the expansion will
also come from state bonds and

grants from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The first day at The Flower Shop, he watered the hundreds of potted plants and looked for insect pests through a magnifying glass. (As we said, he didn't find any at The Flower Shop).


This last Sunday afternoon he did some slipping of Martha Washington geraniums and others, put the slips in Rootone, a fungicide and root-growth promoter; helped Frances get another glass house ready and heat on, and moved 150 geranium plants there, to make room for 500 petunias soon to arrive at The Flower Shop, for transplanting.

Paul is a 1973 graduate of Beal City High School, and has been an FFA member since starting.
"I love this work," he said.
