Three weeks ago I bought four dozen of the Ball zinc caps, plus four dozen jar rubbers. I've enclosed the tops off a dozen zinc caps, also a dozen of jar rubbers, and you will note the price. (25 cents for the rubbers, \$1.99 for a dozen zinc lids.)

I can a lot of tomatoes, and peaches and pears, which Howard likes better than the canned ones you buy in the store.

When I started into canning 35 years ago, one used mostly the zinc lids, so over the years one doesn't have to buy new ones every year, if you are careful.

Yes, I've used the Kerr lids, and last year I was lucky to get three dozen lids, but no more since then.
So, this year I had to get a

few more of the (old-fashioned) lids, as so many call them, so I'd have enough for my canning needs.



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SUMMER WORK FOR HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS

The Mid-Michigan Aliance, Inc., serving eight counties in-cluding Isabella, has been notified that additional funds are being released to provide work experience for in-school students aged 14 to 21.

Only those from low-income families are eligible. Eight hours of work per week at \$2.10 per hour constitutes the program. The program is paid for by the Department of Labor.

Only governmental units, such as townships, villages, cities, counties, and non-profit agencies are eligible to employ the students.


