THE CANNING LID SHORTAGE: NOBODY SAYS MUCH ABOUT IT

So the bigger newspapers are finally beginning to take notice of the scandalous shortage of homecanning lids, but no paper we've seen thus far has said much about it. Some words, yes; but sensible explanations and solutions? No.

The Mt. Pleasant Times-News said in its June 18 edition, "Canning Lids Are in Ample Supply." That was the heading of the story

The Times-News merely quoted Mrs. Nancy Harvey Steorts, a special assistant to the Secretary of Agriculture for Consumer Affairs, to the effect that periodic checks of manufacturers indicate they are working at full capacity.

(Ed's note: What IS their capacity? One machine per company? Possibly two? Nobody has said, thus far.)

All the Times-News story really said was that home canners in the northeast (of the United States) will get lids when the manufacturers deem the area is ready to can.

The Detroit Free Press of Sunday, June 22, carried a cour-column heading, "Canning Lid Shortage Strikes Detroit".

Again, the Free Press didn't say much of anything except to accuse housewives of hoarding can lids by the case or truckload, the article would indicate.

A Chatham food store manager told the Free Press, "People are hoarding them, grabbing them off the shelves in unreasonable numbers."

Our own experience, in querying store managers, is that the stores simply have not been getting the lids. Ask Keith Baumann. Ask Vic's Market or any other big store in Mt. Pleasant.

The Free Press did quote a spokesman for Sears, Roebuck stores as saying, the store has plenty of canning jars (as have all stores), but no lids.

"We haven't received any lids in 1975, but don't say that," the Sears, Roebuck man told the Free Press.

All food stores have huge piles of canning jars, complete with tops and lids. But no lids.

AUTOMOTIVE CENTER AT MID MICHIGAN COLLEGE

Mid Michigan Community College at Harrison will receive a federal grant for the construction of an automotive technology center, it was announced this week.

The automotive center will provide much-needed space for the training of auto mechanics in the mid-Michigan area.

The new automotive program will prepare the graduate to meet all necessary requirement for certification as a master mechanic, required by a recent Michigan law covering licenses of auto mechanics.

The program will serve both the person who desires to become an auto mechanic and also the currently employed mechanic who wants to increase his proficiency in his occupation.

The program will produce approximately 50 graduates a year, with another 60 to 90 students engaged in inservice, upgrading education.

There will be little difficulty in placing graduates in the mid-Michigan area, the college says, as there are currently more than 258 automotive service businesses employing over 800 persons in the area.
